THE CHILDREN WERE VERMIN-INFESTED

Awful Condition of Youngster Who Lived in a Single Room Near Woodstock.

Woodstock, April 21.—High County Constable Ben Hobson brought to the House of Refuge last night seven of the eight children found in the horrible quarters occupied by Elizabeth Davis, arrested at Richmond on Monday afternoon, charged with bigamy, and Martin Cronkright, with whom she was living, and to whom she had been last married, charged with vagrancy.

The eighth child, the oldest, was left at Paris, where he is working. The children were in terrible shape and unconsciously dirty. Their hair was matted with vermin, and Mrs. Murray, matron of the refuge, took a pair of horse clippers and removed the hair of all. Their bodies were literally black with dirt, and apparently they had not been washed for months. Their clothing was in rags and very filthy.

The children range in age from three years to fifteen years, and with the exception of one who has lost an eye, by an accident, appear to be intelligent and sound physically, though they are dwarfed mentally and physically by their absolute lack of training.

The children did not know the taste of milk, and did not like it at first. They are in charge of the Children's Aid Society, and will be placed in homes.

The family of ten had one bedroom ten feet square, and littered up with rubbish at that. People of the neighborhood knew of their condition, but were disinclined towards taking any action.

It is said that when the woman married Cronkright in Paris last February, having two other husbands alive, the couple borrowed money for the license and proffered the minister ten cents, the extent of their wealth, as his fee. He declined it. The man says he married the woman to get someone to look after his children. And she brought her five by former husbands, and they went into partnership.

DEMAND FOR BODIES

Doctors Insist That They Be Handed Over According to Law.

Kingston, April 21.—The Queen's Medical College authorities are dissatisfied over the way the public institutions deprive them of dissecting material, and will ask the Ontario and Dominion Governments here to confer with the anatomy law. When persons died in the asylums and penitentiaries, and their bodies are not claimed by friends, the inspector of anatomy should be called in and the remains turned over to him for the medical college. This has not always been done, and the Government, it is alleged, has had to pay for the burial of unclaimed bodies. When the law is not carried out it frequently compels students to secure bodies in irregular ways.

ANGLICAN MISSIONS

Bishops From All Parts of Canada Gather at Toronto.

Toronto, April 21.—The half-yearly meeting of the board of management of the Missionary Society of the Church in England in Canada, which takes place tomorrow, has brought the ends of the Dominion together in Toronto.

Rogers, Kingston, and Mr. Wm. Jarvis, St. John N. B.

It is expected that a very definite and vigorous policy of action in regard to continuing and extending the church's missionary work will be considered.

SCHOOL BOOK WORK GOES TO THE EATONS

A Ten-Year Agreement Made With Ontario Government.

Toronto, April 21.—A great deal of surprise was expressed today by the various publishing and printing houses in the city at the low rate at which the contract for the publication of the new Ontario school books was awarded to the T. Eaton Company. Both S. G. Beatty, president of the Canada Publishing Company, Limited, and W. P. Gundy, general manager of the W. J. Gage Company, Limited, asserted that the Eaton Company would lose money on the contract, while Mr. Copp, of Copp-Clark Company, thought the Eaton price was too low for them to make a fair profit.

Mr. R. Y. Eaton, superintendent of the T. Eaton Company, however, stated that the company knew what they were doing, and that they had not tied themselves up with a ten-year contract without having taken every feature into consideration.

It is understood that the next lowest tender was 61 cents, as against the successful one of 39 1-5 cents.

The contract was yesterday awarded

to the Eaton people for 49 cents, with a discount of 20 per cent for cash, bringing the net price of the set of five books down to 39 cents. The old price for the books was \$1.15 for the set, and in 1907, for second-hand books, the Government paid 49 cents. The contract for the new readers supplies handsome modern school books at prices which are without a parallel in Canada. The retail price of the set is 49 cents for five readers. From this price there is a discount of 20 per cent, making the net price of the set 39 1-5 cents.

GOVT. AMENDMENTS TO THE CRIMINAL CODE

Minister of Justice Proposes That Important Clauses Be Added.

Ottawa, April 21.—The bill of Mr. A. B. Aylesworth to amend the criminal code received its first reading today. The first object of the bill is to simplify procedure so as to make it possible to take action against a municipality, corporation or other before a justice of the peace.

To widen the provision of existing laws in reference to the circulation of obscene and immoral literature and pictures to the public, so as to make it possible to punish those who assist in distributing or circulating such matter, or have it in their possession for the purpose of circulation. Also to make it a punishable offence to exhibit or circulate plates for the purpose of the manufacture of immoral literature and pictures.

To increase the limit of imprisonment for those found guilty of procuring women for immoral purposes from two to five years. To extend the provisions of the present law in regard to bawdy and gambling houses, to include opium joints, thereby following up the legislation of last session, prohibiting the use of opium except for medical purposes.

To make it a punishable offence to steal gold or silver-bearing quartz and to make it less difficult to convict offenders. This is to check the numerous offences of this kind reported from Cobalt and other mining districts.

To make it a criminal offence to reproduce or sell copies of a copyrighted musical production.

To lengthen the period that cattle can be confined in railway cars from 28 to 36 hours.

To provide that in future all cases of manslaughter in Ontario shall be heard in the superior courts. Under the present practice many charges of manslaughter are tried in the court of common sessions.

FIRE AT ATLANTA.

Atlanta, Ga., April 21.—Fire which started in the third floor of the building near the corner of Alabama and South Frier streets, in the rear of the Constitution building, occupied by the Keystone Type Founders Company, this morning destroyed this building and one adjoining, occupied by the spool company. The loss is estimated at \$50,000.

STRIKE RIOT AT NEW YORK

Two Non-Union Teamsters Mobbed and Terribly Beaten.

New York, April 21.—In an attack by an angry crowd upon a truck belonging to one of the firms against which a strike has been declared by local teamsters two men were badly injured in Hoboken today.

The injured men are Joe Sullivan, driver of the truck, employed by Jackson Bros., of this city, and Jos. Hayden, a special officer riding with Sullivan on the vehicle. The truck had been driven through Jersey under police protection, as such attacks had been threatened.

The crowd followed the vehicle across the Hoboken line and there attacked Sullivan and Hayden, who were struck repeatedly with stones and beaten with sticks and fists so seriously that when the Hoboken police appeared and drove off the mob the men were almost unconscious and had to be taken to a hospital. Hayden may suffer the loss of an ear and the driver sustained serious wounds on the face and body.

A HOT CONFLAGRATION IN HOTHOUSE PLANT

Explosion in Toronto Suburb Destroys Four Acres of Conservatories.

Toronto, April 21.—With an explosion which was heard at a great distance, one of the four big boilers in the extensive conservatories of Miller & Son, Brantford, blew up at 1:30 this afternoon. The force of the explosion not only completely demolished the boiler-house and remaining three boilers, but razed to the ground four acres of hothouses.

Twenty-three men were at work about the conservatories, and notwithstanding the fact that glass, bricks and pieces of machinery were blown high into the air and fell all about them, no one was seriously injured, although all were cut and bruised. The first intimation of the danger came when one of the firemen ran upstairs to deliver the alarm.

TRADE RELATIONS WITH GERMANY

Sir Richard Cartwright Says Government Is Moving in the Matter.

Ottawa, April 21.—Sir Richard Cartwright in the Senate today said that the Government was looking towards better commercial relations with Germany.

Sir Richard was replying to a question by Senator Loughheed, who asked what truth there was in the report that negotiations had been undertaken by Canada and Germany with respect to reciprocal trade relations.

"There have been no formal negotiations," said Sir Richard. "There have been negotiations, but they have been of an informal character. There have been no negotiations with any authenticated representative of the German Government."

CANADA'S RACIAL QUESTION LOOKED BIG

Hon. C. G. Murray Thinks It Will Last Long—Leeds Choir May Visit Dominion.

London, April 21.—Hon. C. G. Murray, securing on the South African Union before the Royal Society of Arts said he found Canada's racial question, which appeared to exceed anything he had read in South Africa, one which, when the racial question in South Africa had become a matter of history, would be a fair to be still present.

A shamfight wherein 17,000 troops will be engaged has been fixed for June 1 at Aldershot for the Imperial Journalists.

Dr. Harriss has given a formal invitation to the Leeds Choir to visit Canada next spring.

THE WHITE PLAGUE WAR

Ninth Annual Meeting of Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption.

The ninth annual meeting and convention of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption and other forms of tuberculosis is to be held in Hamilton on Wednesday afternoon, Dr. White, of Pittsburgh, and Thursday, May 19 and 20 next.

The morning of the first day will be devoted to the reading of reports and the appointment of committees. In the afternoon Dr. White, of Pittsburgh, will deliver an address on "The Duty of Municipalities in Reference to Tuberculosis." In the evening of the same day his worship, the mayor will deliver an address of welcome, after which Dr. Adams, of Montreal, will speak on a subject which ought to command attention, "How to Do Most Good in Arresting Tuberculosis at the Smallest Outlay."

The topic set down for general discussion during the forenoon of Thursday is "The Duty of the People Toward the Movement for the Extinction of Consumption." Hon. Adam Beck, Mr. Downey, M. P., Dr. Fagan, of Victoria, B. C., Dr. Geo. D. Porter, and a number of others, both physicians and laymen, are expected to take part in the discussion of this subject.

On Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock the meeting will adjourn to the Mountain Sanatorium to attend a reception

given by the ladies of Hamilton. Not the least uninteresting part of the programme is the visit to the sanatorium, when it will be seen how much can be done for the treatment and cure of consumption at a moderate cost. The success of the Mountain Sanatorium should furnish an object lesson well worthy of the study of municipalities contemplating action for the reduction of tuberculosis within their own neighborhood.
