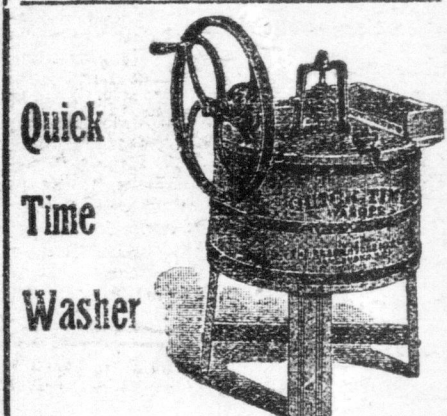

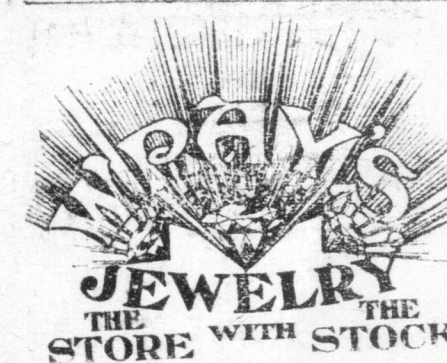

## A SPLENDID FIGHT AGAINST WHITE PLAGUE

Infirmary at the Sanatorium Is  
Crowded, But Accommoda-  
tion Is To Be Increased.

A regular meeting of the members  
of the London Health Association was  
held on Saturday afternoon, at which  
the reports of Dr. Bruce, superintend-  
ent of the Hyron Sanatorium for Con-  
sumptives, and the visiting nurse who  
is engaged in London and St. Thomas  
were received.

The infirmary at the hospital is now  
crowded to its capacity, but arrange-  
ments were made to alleviate the situa-  
tion. The work of the nurse is de-  
veloping rapidly, and much good is  
being done in the fight against the  
white plague. In St. Thomas efforts  
were put forward to have a dispens-  
ary established in connection with  
the board of health of that city, but  
the feeling prevailed there that such  
a department was unnecessary. The  
people of St. Thomas were evidently  
under the impression that the city is  
in a very healthy condition, but a  
number of cases of tuberculosis were  
discovered by the nurse, who assisted  
the patients to a very great extent.

The Sanatorium is not yet on a self-  
supporting basis, but is said to be pro-  
gressing very favorably.

Dr. Guest, of St. Thomas, represent-  
ed that city at the meeting, while Dr.  
Ling, of Dutton, was the delegate from  
the county of Elgin. These in at-  
tendance were Hon. Adam Beck, who  
presided; Sheriff Cameron, Police  
Magistrate J. C. Judd, Dr. Tillmann,  
Dr. Guest, Dr. Ling, and Col. Gar-  
shore.

The annual meeting of the London  
Health Association is to be held on  
Wednesday, May 1.

MADE INTO SECRETAIRE**

A Unique Piece of Furniture In  
Window of Heintzman & Co.  
on Dundas Street.

The Heintzman Piano Company have on  
exhibition at their store on Dundas street  
an artistic piece of furniture that is at-  
tracting much attention. It is an old-fash-  
ioned piano that has been made into a  
secretaire and cabinet combined. The out-  
side casing of the desk remains as it  
originally was in piano form, and when  
the top of the desk is down it has the ap-  
pearance of a piano.

A desk attachment with pigeonholes  
and the other features of a modern secre-  
taire has replaced the keyboard, while the  
upper part has been made into a cabinet  
that can be used for books or china.

The casing of the cabinet is mahogany,  
and in converting it from a piano to a  
secretaire its original appearance has not  
been altered. The antiquity of the casing  
lends interest to the cabinet, for it is  
over one hundred and ten years old. The

## NO SUCH THING AS A-SELF MADE MAN

Rev. Harper Gary's Powerful  
Sermon in the First Pres-  
byterian Church.

**DIVES AND LAZARUS**

The Story of the Rich and the Poor  
Brought Home to Londoners on  
Sunday Night.

At the First Presbyterian Church on  
Sunday night Rev. Harper Gary, pas-  
tor of Old St. Andrew's Church, Tor-  
onto, delivered a most impressive  
sermon on "Poverty and Riches." The  
story was recited by Luke, the poet-  
painter of the evangelists. To him the  
church is indebted for most of the par-  
ables, which are told by an artist. The  
meaning of the parable is often mis-  
taken. For instance, it is not Luke's  
intention to tell the secrets of the  
prison house in the other world. The  
writer used the language of the Jewish  
underworld of his time. It furnished  
the drapery, the setting, the scenery  
of the little drama.

The first portion, or scene of this  
dramatic story, was in the form of a  
tableau. The story of a rich man, with  
mansions, and servants, and all that  
go to form a luxurious life were told.  
Dives never did anything true or noble  
or great. He was rich. Without the  
house, blustering in the sun, destitute  
and in rags, sat the beggars. One of  
these is given a name, Lazarus. Be-  
tween the two men there was a great  
gulf fixed—the extremes of the social  
scale.

**The Social Chasm.**  
"Does the parable say that there  
should be no such chasm," asked the  
speaker. "It does not say that. Even  
if the greatest dreams of Socialism  
came true, the lots of men still would  
not be equal. There would still be a  
gulf fixed. Dives was not responsible  
for the social distinction. That was  
not his sin. His sin was that he never  
felt the call of his brother's need at  
his door. He never felt that beneath  
the rags and poverty at his gate a  
man's heart beat. The most prominent  
feature of prosperity is the tendency  
to grow morally proud. The rich man  
begins to think that he is worth the  
prosperity that is his; that there must  
be some moral defect in the poor man,  
or he too, would have the same pros-  
perity. He prides himself on what is,  
after all, accidental. The lots of men  
are different, but there is not neces-  
sarily any moral distinction between the  
two. God help the self-made man!  
There never was such a thing; not  
even Andrew Carnegie. Accident and  
chance fall to all men. Every great  
man, or rich man, is the inheritor of  
ages, all his ancestors contributing to  
him the qualities that made him what  
he is.

**Dives and Lazarus.**  
"Had Dives placed himself in the  
place of Lazarus, there would have  
been no need of the second portion of  
this story. It was the sin of inhu-  
manity. That may be your sin, too.  
You are Dives to some Lazarus. There  
is some person in the world who wants  
your help and assistance. The gulf  
can be bridged. The call is at your  
door. Heed it!"

The second scene was in the Jewish  
underworld, where all dead go, good  
and bad alike. There was supposed to  
be a thin partition between the two.  
In this case the thin wall has given  
way to a chasm. The gulf was pres-  
ent in the first scene, the chasm be-  
tween the very rich and the very poor.  
Lazarus is comforted and Dives is tor-  
mented. The judgment of heaven is  
not the judgment of earth. Dives was  
tormented because he had the oppor-  
tunity to show his heart to a brother,  
to bridge the gulf by kindness and  
humanity, but he failed to do so. Self  
must be overcome. That underlies all  
inhumanity, the greatest of all sins.

**A Lonely Soul.**  
Dives had asked that a ghost return  
from the dead to persuade his family  
to repent, but there was no need of a  
ghostly visitor to tell men of sin. If  
they heeded not the teachings of Christ  
they would not be convinced although  
a man rose from the dead.

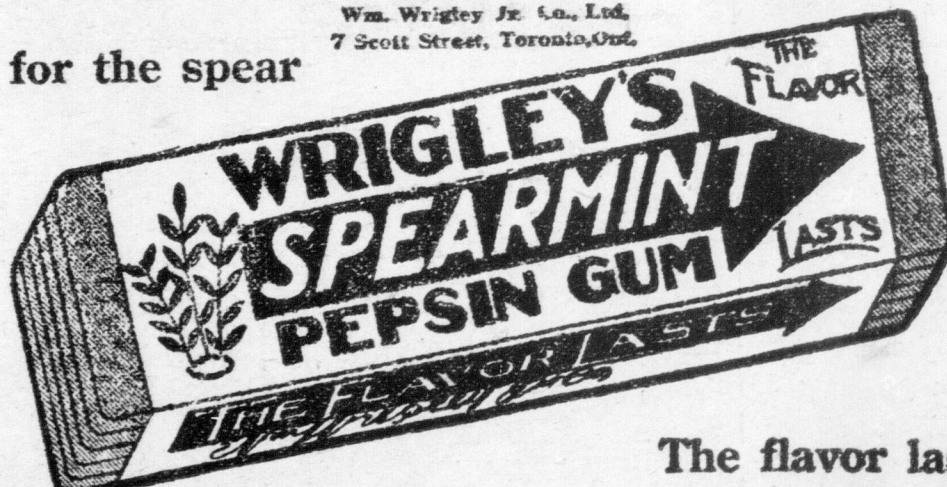
