CLERICAL HEALERS WARNED

Doctors, Say Investigators.

London, April 11.-A report has been made by a committee, of which the Dean of Westminster is chairman, in regard to the faith-healing movement in all its aspects, with particular atention to the matter of the best means of obtaining closer co-operation between physicians and clergymen.

The committee was appointed eigheen months ago. It admits that there s room for co-operation between the wo professions within clearly defined limits, "with a view to the alleviation f physical suffering through the menal or spiritual condition of the paient," but it would have safeguards thrown around this co-operation. It ounds this warning:

"That any attempt on the part of the clergy to enter into competition with the medical practitioner by any eparate and independent treatment o the sick is to be strongly deprecated not merely on practical but also on religious grounds. For there is a serious danger lest the association of the ministry should divert attention from the primary purpose of that ministry and prove injurious to individua
