



#### LONDON TOWNSHIP **CHANGES SUBDIVISIONS**

Evidently Believe That Annexation Is as Good as Passed.

The London township council will oppose the annexation of Pottersburg and Ealing, but from present indications they are not confident that they will succeed. The polling subdivisions in Potters

burg, Ealing and Knollwood Park are known as Nos. 6, 7 and 8. If these suburbs are annexed these subdivisions will have to be changed. At the last meeting of the township council these changes were made and new subdivisions arranged for.
