LACK OF SEWERS ALARMS FACTORY OWNERS IN EAST

McCormick Company Sees a Serious Menace if Work Is Not Done.

Mayor Intimates That Vote on Sewers Will Be Taken in October.

When the board of works met for its first meeting in the mayor's office of the new city hall Thursday night it had considerable business on hand. Mr. Thomas McCormick and Mr. W. Frost, the latter an engineer, who is looking after the construction of the new McCormick plant in East London, appeared and urged upon the committee the serious predicament in which the company finds itself on account of a lack of proper sewage disposal facilities in that district. The council, he said, did not realize the seriousness of the situation. The possibility of serious trouble are great, and in the event of the contractors not reaching a stage where the building could be closed in and heated before the cold weather sets in, the foundations and buildings would be damaged considerably by the water, which cannot be taken away with the present sewer accommodations, freezing and breaking all the stage connections, which are about a mile in length, and which are already laid under the building.

Main Is Overtaxed.
Mr. Frost explained that the present sanitary main is already overtaxed, and that it is impossible to tap any other main owing to the depth of the sewers in the building and the levels at which the sanitary sewers are constructed.

Engineer Ashplant admitted that there was only one way out of the difficulty, and that was to start work as soon as possible on the Egerton street section of the storm water system, which he claimed would, when completed, relieve every factory in the manufacturing district.

He admitted that it would be a hard proposition to complete the work before the severest part of the winter arrived, but Mayor Graham said that if he got the sanction of the people for a storm water system by the middle of October he thought the work out there could be completed by December. "The only thing we can do," said the mayor, "is to put this matter up to the people on or about the first of October. Then when they decide what we are to do, we will be in a better position to talk."

Switch Across Street.
Mr. McCormick made application for a permit authorizing the C. P. R. to cross Nightingale avenue with a switch from the main line to run into the McCormick factory. This siding is to run parallel with the Grand Trunk interswitching line and will be constructed if the C. P. R. can obtain running rights over the interswitching line.

Ald. Saunders moved that this matter be referred to the city engineer for a report, and that if this report is favorable, the council give permission at the next meeting.

Mr. George Geoghegan appeared to protest against the delay in constructing a cement walk on the north side of St. James street between William and Adelaide streets. Part of the work has been finished, he declared, but the rest was being abandoned. The city engineer explained that the work had been abandoned because considerable filling in had to be done on that side of the street, but that as soon as the filling settled sufficiently to support a sidewalk the work would be finished.

Requests on the part of W. J. Wray, the Hermitage Club, Goulray, Winter & Leeming and W. G. Young, to string banners across Dundas street, were filed.

The engineer was instructed to go ahead and move the sidewalk back on Horton street between Richmond and Talbot streets before the work of paving the street was started.

After some discussion as to the best method to remedy the overflowing of the Queen's avenue sewer into the new Masonic Temple, the engineer was instructed to make an opening at the

edge of the curb in front of the building to learn whether the sewer needs cleaning, or if the connections are at fault. If the former condition exists the city is to pay for it, and if it is the latter the Masonic Temple Company is to settle the bill. This arrangement was suggested by Mayor Graham, after a conference with the president of the Masonic Temple Company.

The engineer recommended that Wortley road between Byron and Asklin be paved, and that he be instructed to call for tenders for the paving of the same road. This was sent on to the council.

The Garbage System.
Superintendent Dodd, of the garbage collection department, reported that during the month of August 1,473 tons of garbage had been destroyed during 743 1/2 working hours. This was an average of 2,017 tons per hour. He also asked permission to have a pipe run from the boiler at the incinerator into the river to furnish the boiler with water. This would not cost more than \$25 in his estimation and would eliminate the necessity of using city water. A saving of about \$100 a year would be effected in this way. On motion of the mayor, it was decided to go ahead with the work without sending the matter to the council.

Several petitions for garbage collection on streets outside the present area were filed, and will not be considered until next year's council meets.

"DO THE WORK AND CHARGE IT TO 'EM"

Ald. Bennett Takes This Attitude in Regard to Street Railway.

Ald. B. W. Bennett complained strenuously at the meeting of the board of works Thursday night of the condition of the street railway tracks on Dundas street in East London. He complained that every joint in the track from Portersburg to the corner of Dundas and Ontario street was in bad condition, and that as a result the foundation of the pavement on Dundas street was being spoiled.

"It is time we got after those people," said he. "They are doing pretty much as they like in this city."

Engineer Ashplant said he had notified the company of the condition of the tracks, but that nothing had been done to remedy it.

"There is no use in notifying them," said Ald. Bennett. "The only thing to do is to go ahead and do the work and charge it up to the company."

Mr. Ashplant will write again to Manager King explaining to him the harm that is being done to the pavement and if no action is taken, the city will likely go ahead and do the work.

Mr. W. C. Dodd asked the board of works at the meeting held Thursday night to build a little garage for him to store his little car, with the "Public Works Department" engraved upon it.

He had inquired the price of boarding nice little automobiles at the different garages, he said, and found that it would cost the city from \$7 to \$8 a month.

Ald. Saunders suggested that a garage sufficiently large enough to accommodate Mr. Dodd's and the city engineer's cars be erected at the rear of the city hall. Building Inspector Piper also asked that some place be provided for the horse used by his department, so room for the horse was included in Ald. Saunders' original suggestion.

Before the matter was finally settled Ald. Saunders suggested that after the garage is built it be furnished with one lock, and that the key to the lock be turned over to the city clerk, who would have the pleasure of locking the garage at night and opening it in the morning.
