LONDONER'S BROTHER WAS A GREAT ORGANIZER

Notable Career of Late Samuel Lee Bapty, Brother of Mr. Harry Bapty, of This City.

The Manchester City News contains reference to the death in that city f Mr. Samuel Lee Bapty, eldest broher of Mr. Harry Bapty, of this city.

The News says: Mr. Samuel Lee Bapty, who died at Moss Side yesterday week, will be renembered by the older generation of Manchester citizens as the manager of he Royal Jubilee Exhibition at Old Frafford in 1887. He was made a chevalier of the National Order of the legion of Honor in 1886. Many interesting reminiscences will be recalled by Mr. Lee Bapty's death.

When the Manchester Exhibition was drawing to a close in 1887 the Journal of Fabrics and Textile Industries wrote

"Mr. Bapty appears to be a gentleman born with a special faculty for filling such a position as the one he has occupied as general manager of the Manchester Exhibition with such marked success. This is not by many the first exhibition which Mr. Bapty has piloted to a successful issue. His first experience was gained in the exhibition instituted by the Royal Dublin Society in 1864, and the Dublin International in 1865 again found him at his post. At the Naval and Submarine Exhibition in London in 1882 he had
