FRENCH TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS CAPTURED GERMAN SHIPS

Nicholas, Emperor Francis Joseph, and President Poincare: "As offical head of one of the powers signatory to The Hague Convention, I feel it to be my privilege and my duty, under Article 3 of that convention, to say to you, in a spirit of most earnest friendship, that I should welcome an opportunity to act in the interest of European peace, either now or any other time, that might be thought more suitable, as an occasion to serve you and all concerned in a way that would afford me lasting cause for graititude and happiness.
