CABINET CONFERENCE ON ELECTRICAL MATTERS

Whitney and Beck Talk Things

Any Statement.

Toronto, July 31. — Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the hydro-electric commission, was in conference with Sir James Whitney at the Premier's office at the Parliament Buildings yesterday afternoon, and both attended a subsequent meeting of the cabinet. The air was full of rumors concerning possible Government action relative to expropriation of the Electrical Development Company and other contingencies which might arise from the recent negotiations between Mayor Hocken and Sir William Mackenzie, but neither Sir James nor Hon. Mr. Beck, when interviewed, following the cabinet meeting, would give any corroboration to the many rumors afloat.

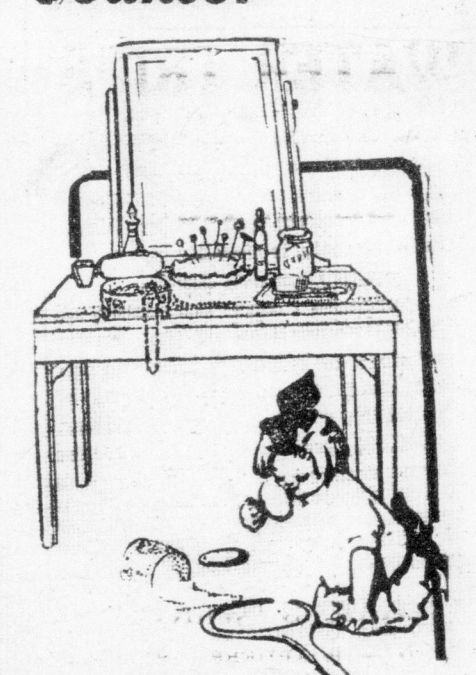

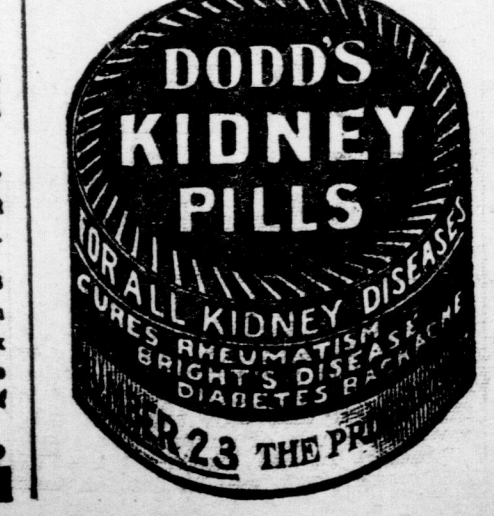
