ALMIGHTY HEART STRONGER THAN \$1

Sir Gilbert Parker Pays a
Tribute To United States'
Attitude.

LONDON, April 15.—11:15 p.m.—Sir Gilbert Parker took occasion at a meeting of the Pilgrims tonight to pay a warm tribute to the United States for the attitude it has maintained during the war. He said: "Never has a neutral nation had such problems as the United States has faced with a temperateness, courtesy and moderation for which this country cannot be too grateful."

"The American Government," continued the speaker, "has pursued the only course possible to a nation desirous of preserving its deservedly high reputation in the field of diplomacy. It has been in true sympathy with the high-mindedness and sensible idealism of the American people in regard to the great events of the world's history. It is not surprising, therefore, that all the combatants in this great war desire at least America's good opinion."

Standing influence needed. Later in the course of his speech, Sir Gilbert said: "In the interests of stable civilization, it is essential that a steady, wholesome, dispassionate, honorable influence shall be used in the interests of the whole world, particularly the interests of the small nations, when the end of the war comes."

He praised the work of the American ambassadors in connection with the prisoners and declared that the editorials in the American press were a credit to the journalists and their publications, and showed that "Americans understood this war even better than we do." He rejoiced that "at least one great nation has a population at peace, is not building up a debt of thousands of millions, or living on credit, and is free from the direct disturbance of finance caused by the peremptory and formidable necessities of war," and in conclusion, exclaimed: "The almighty heart is still stronger in the United States than the almighty dollar."

GOVERNMENT AID IN DRAINING LANDS IS WHAT IS NEEDED

Ilderton Farms Now Show Necessity—
School Fair Plans.

[Special to The Advertiser.] ILDERTON, April 15.—Some plowing is being done around Ilderton, but no seeding as yet. Some of the Lobo farmers on the well-drained land are cultivating, and seeding will be in full swing in a few days. It is felt that the Government should include traction ditching along with the "Production Campaign," as only well-drained fields are yet ready to cultivate.

District Representative I. B. Whale passed through Lobo yesterday visiting the schools and distributing seeds to the pupils who will compete at the school fair to be held in October. The work is doing much good and seems quite popular. One object to be attained is to keep the boys on the land.

Mr. Whale is quite optimistic as to the effect of this work. The pupils, he says, are willing and eager to grow the crops and the coming school fair promises to be the biggest yet. Mr. Webster, the expert printer, who has been for some time working in the Ilderton F. G. A. orchards, was called by Prof. Hodgkiss yesterday to oversee the pruning of Peter McArthur's orchard at Glenora.

The executive of the F. G. A. is now ordering supplies for lime-sulphur, lead, etc., for the season.

HUERTA WON'T TELL WHO KILLED MADERO

Knows, But Declares He Had
Nothing To Do With
Deed

[Canadian Press.]

NEW YORK, April 15.—Vehemently asserting that he had nothing to do with the death of Francisco Madero, Gen. Victoriano Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, issued a lengthy signed statement tonight, setting forth what he termed his side of the Mexican question. Gen. Huerta declared that he knew who was responsible for Madero's death, but that he was keeping it as a "professional secret."

Gen. Huerta's statement reviewed the history of the Madero revolution, his own succession to the presidency, and concluded with the assertion that "my country cannot be conquered." Sixteen millions of men, women and children would have to be killed before Mexico would submit to an invader, he said.

Score Washington. The heads of the Washington administration, he declared, had not been fair to Mexico, had been misled by false statements, and if they had been in Mexico for thirty days, "they would have changed their theoretical erroneous ideas." Had it not been for the embargo on the exportation of arms from this country, Gen. Huerta indicated that his army would have overthrown those opposed to it. The former provisional President reiterated the assertion which he made when he left Mexico last year, that he had resigned from his position only because he hoped to bring peace to his country.

He pointed out that in the eight months elapsed since the date, the situation in Mexico had become "too sad for me to analyze deeply."

Worse Than Anarchy. "Anarchy is too soft a word to call it," he said, "Mexico would eventually be saved, but by a Mexican. Who that would be he did not know."

Discussing the death of Madero, he said: "That is a professional secret. Lawyers have secrets, doctors have secrets. I am a soldier—why should not a soldier have secrets? It is not through friendship for anyone that I am withholding the information. It is a professional duty."

"It has been said that you betrayed the confidence of President Madero. Is it so?" he was asked. He straightened up proudly, his eyes flashed, and bringing his clenched fist against his breast, he replied: "No! I swear it. I was in no way responsible for his death. It has been one of the big tortures of my life. I am sorry I have to keep the secret. Although I am of a different race than you gentlemen, I am a man."

DONALD SUTHERLAND
DIES AT FOREST

[Special to The Advertiser.] FOREST, April 15.—Donald Sutherland died this evening, aged 76. He was born in Argyllshire, and came to Canada as a boy. He was truly a pioneer, having cleared farms in Princeton, Ross and Brookville townships. He served as reeve and deputy reeve in Brookville for many years.

A widow, three sons and five daughters survive him. The sons are: Alexander, now with the Canadian troops in Victoria, B. C., ready to go to the front; Donald, a sapper, at Ottawa, with the engineering corps training for service; and Roger, at home.

The funeral will be held on Saturday to Beachwood Cemetery, with service at 3 p.m.
