Meighen and Manitoba Supporters Evade Queries on Party Funds.

ATTACK CRERAR POLICY

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 15.—(By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—Somewhat unexpectedly the subject of party fund contributions to political campaigns was interjected into Premier Meighen's speech at his meeting in the village of Headingley, some twelve miles from the city this afternoon. The prime minister aroused the opposition of a man called William Kelly, who deals in agricultural implements at Headingley, by some of his remarks with reference to the United Grain Growers, and Mr. Kelly proceeded to ask where the party funds of the premier were being raised.

"They don't come from the Wheat Export Company," replied Mr. Meighen referring to a previous statement he has made to the effect that the profits of the Wheat Export Company had been used to finance the Grain Growers' Guide, and the further the political ambitions of Mr. Crerar and H. W. Wood.

"Where do they come from?" insisted Mr. Kelly.

"Those who subscribe to them can tell if they so desire," the premier answered, and Colonel Harry Mullins, prominent farmer of Portage La Prairie district, remarked that he had contributed to them.

Then Questions Heckled.

"I contributed to them, too," said the prime minister. The premier then countered by asking Mr. Kelly a question.

"What is Mr. Crerar's grain policy?" he asked.

"Never mind the policy; get on with something else," replied Mr. Kelly.

"There you have Mr. Crerar's grain policy," replied Mr. Meighen, amid some laughter.

Mr. Kelly interrupted at another point when the prime minister was telling the purpose for which the United Grain Growers had been formed and insisting that this company had not fulfilled those purposes.

"Has that company rewarded the abuses which it was organized to remedy?" asked Mr. Meighen.

"Yes," replied Mr. Kelly, firmly.

Assaults Grain Growers.

The premier declared that the United Grain Growers had gone on the grain exchange and committed all the other grain companies. "They put \$100,000 of their profits into the Grain Growers' Guide," he said.

"They did not," retorted Mr. Kelly. "Then is the evidence of Mr. Elton Jones before the court of living contentions?" queried the premier.

Mr. Kelly then repeated his statement that the United Grain Growers had put no money into the Grain Growers' Guide.

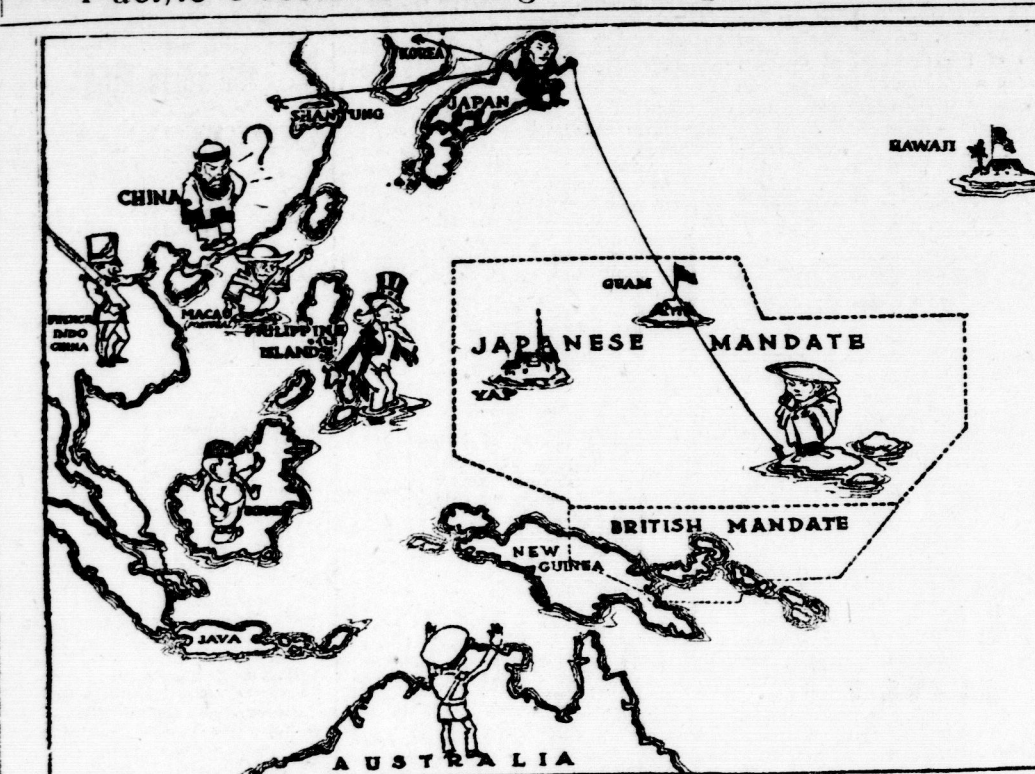

WANT GOVERNMENT THAT
WILL PRACTICE ECONOMY

Meeting at Coldstream in Support of Farmer Candidate.

ILDERTON, Nov. 15.—A public meeting of electors in the interest of J. D. Drummond, U. F. O. candidate, was held in the town hall, Coldstream, Friday evening.

Having to attend a meeting at Carleton Place, J. D. Drummond was not able to be present. J. S. Brown, M.L.A. for North Middlesex, and six local men were the speakers. The tariff, the huge debt and even the road policy of the Ontario Government were discussed.

J. S. Brown, M.L.A., said he had known Drummond for a long time, and felt that the convention at Stratford had made a splendid choice.

Three years ago, said Mr. Brown, the armistice was signed, but we have been getting deeper into debt all the time. Now we want a government that will practice economy.

Discussing the tariff, he said \$600,000,000 goes into the pockets of the manufacturers and big interests, and \$150,000,000 to the government revenue. In other words, for every dollar revenue \$4 goes into the pockets of the big interests. When you buy made-in-Canada all goes there. The farmer has to hunt for a market and take what he can get. Dealing with an article in a recent number of the "Backus Deal," Mr. Brown explained the contract, and declared the article to be "false and garbled" for federal election purposes.

He also outlined and justified the government's road policy. A. D. Fletcher said the farmers' movement originated in the West, but has spread all over the Dominion, even Quebec and the Maritime Provinces being partly organized. In his opinion Canada could do very well without the Senate.

This is a critical time, said A. Frank, and as farmers we have just discovered ourselves. We are the only class that has had no representation under the old party system. The old party platforms were constructed so loosely that after election the candidate could kick off any plank that did not suit him.

J. E. Campbell, one of the nominees at the convention, explained how West Middlesex U. F. O. proposes to pay the legitimate expenses of the candidate by each member putting up 50 cents for membership in this political organization.

Meighen says the tariff is the issue, said Mr. Campbell, and forgets to speak of our huge debt, the soon-maturing victory bonds that will have to be met. "Are we," he asked, "going to have a government of the people, by the people and for the people? Our constitution has been trampled in the dust by the Government. What we need and will have is a democratic government."

J. McGugan criticized the new pool act in the county road system and gave an instance of the injustice caused in a Lebo bridge on the Samia road, built by the township, and which, he claimed, should have been handed back when the road was widened.

Edgar M. Zavitz and S. P. Zavitz also spoke, urging all to work for the election of Mr. Drummond. The next meeting will be held at Komoka on Thursday night, when J. D. Drummond and others will speak. A. M. McIntyre presided, and Alex. Stewart was secretary.

CLAIMS BRITAIN IS
VIOLATING TREATY

Russia Charges Wrangel's Army Being Transported On British Ships.

RIGA, Nov. 15.—Charges that Great Britain had allegedly transported a number of Gen. Wrangel's followers from Constantinople to Vladivostok, together with rumors that the British are collecting large forces of "White" Russians in Bombay and Bagdad, are contained in a note sent out by the Russian official news agency.

Aboard a British military transport which has already arrived in Vladivostok, states the agency, are 750 Russians, uniforms, and formerly served with Wrangel's or Denikin's forces.

Soviet Russia, according to the agency's report, energetically protests against this act as a violation of the 1918-1919 treaty between the Soviet Republic and Great Britain, which, in Lord Curzon's note, accused Russia of breaking its agreement by openly assisting the enemies of the Far Eastern Republic.

What to do with the thousands of Cossack and other Russian troops under the command of Gen. Baron Wrangel who were thrown out of the Crimea by the Bolsheviks, and took refuge in and near Constantinople, has been one of the puzzles which has perplexed the allied governments in Europe. In April last it was reported that Wrangel had asked the D. D. Government to convey his men to Vladivostok.

The Soviet Government of Russia has been suspicious that the forces would be used somehow against the Bolshevik Government, and during the past summer the official Russian news agencies have put forth several reports that these troops were to be shipped to Vladivostok to aid the new anti-Bolshevik Government there, or to take the Bolshevik Government to task.

One of the reports was that Japan had agreed with Gen. Wrangel to move his troops to Vladivostok, and that the Soviet Government had lodged a protest against it.

Since coming out of the Crimea, thousands of Wrangel's troops have been living in huts in extreme poverty on the Gallipoli Peninsula, and the island of Lemnos in the Aegean Sea, sustained by the hope that some time their services would be needed to establish a new government in Russia.

Brussels

BRUSSELS, Nov. 15.—Some of the "spoils of the chase" reached here last Saturday in the shape of two fine deer. They were shot on Manitoulin Island.

There will be several entries at the Quebec Winter Fair from this locality. It is expected Hon. Mr. Drury will address a political meeting here in the interests of the Progressive candidate for North Huron, John W. King.

Last week Mrs. Alex. Stewart, an aged resident of Grey Township, died at the age of 83 years. Burial took place in Brussels Cemetery.

Sunday afternoon a granite memorial tablet for the boys of the congregation who died overseas during the war was unveiled in the Methodist Church. Rev. Capt. Edwards, M.C., Seaford, gave a most appropriate address. Rev. Mr. Clarke, pastor of the Methodist church, presided. There was a large audience. Names of five men are on the roll.

First monthly horse fair for this season will be held here Thursday, Dec. 1. The sad news was received here by H. L. Jackson that his mother had passed away suddenly in California at the home of her daughter. She was 89 years of age and was a resident of Brussels for some time. An adult family survives.

OPEN CAMPAIGN
FOR WESTERN 'U'

Public Organizations and Churches Will Urge Passing of Money Bylaws.

Although the majority of Londoners feel that the Western University bylaw for \$250,000 will undoubtedly be passed by a large majority when it is voted upon by the citizens on December 5, members of the different men's organizations are going to take no chances, and at an enthusiastic meeting in the C. of C. rooms Tuesday afternoon, plans were formed for a publicity campaign on a large scale.

Organizations represented at the meeting, which was presided over by C. R. Somerville, were the Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, Canadian and Advertising clubs, as well as representatives from the Chamber of Commerce.

Speakers Named.
Arthur Little was appointed chairman of the entire educational campaign, while T. W. McFarland, James Gray, Lt.-Col. W. J. Brown, J. H. Laughton, Major T. J. Murphy and E. V. Buchanan were named as a speaker's committee.

Dean Sherwood Fox of the Western University, W. R. Yendall, E. V. Buchanan and Roy Lawson will have charge of the city canvass that is contemplated, while the boys' council under Lloyd Houlding will distribute literature giving reasons why citizens should vote for the bylaw.

An extensive newspaper advertising campaign will be started almost immediately under the direction of J. E. McConnell.

The speakers' committee will request majority candidates to speak in favor of the bylaw at all their meetings.

Churches Co-operate.
Dean Fox reported the co-operation on the part of Protestant and Roman Catholic churches. Bishop Fallon has stated, in sending out a pastoral letter to be read in all the Roman Catholic churches. Speakers will attend brotherhood meetings, while the ministerial alliance has promised every possible help.

Mayor Little, as president of the C. of C., is sending out letters to all corporations entitled to vote on money bylaws, asking their support, and requesting that they appoint a nominee to cast a vote in favor of the bylaw.

Automobiles whiz along bearing red banners, these banners are likewise flown from many public buildings, and passes are strictly examined on trains by shabby persons armed with knife and pistol, which every true blue communist has a right to wear.

Works in Secret.
Strange persons, probably intent on postbooks and forgotten or mislaid baggage, represent themselves as members of the Cheka (committee against counter-revolution), when interrupted, the Bolsheviks, in the young revolution, in the contrary, in greater Russia, the Cheka is a gunshoe affair, and when it takes anything, it does so when nobody is looking. It covers its trail even when it makes arrests, thoroughly that the near relatives of the arrested are left in doubt.

Here when the Cheka makes an arrest and later executes, near relatives are broadly informed, when they bring food to the prison, that the person in question no longer needs food, and they had best discontinue their visits.

One of the latest performances of the soviet here was to start a brand new kind of finance. It set out to reform the currency and to improve exchange and general commercial conditions, and took the short cut of arresting 700 of the leading merchants of the country.

They were told they would be shot within a week unless they made a contribution of 25,000,000,000 to the "sanitation fund." They were short half this sum, about \$200,000 in real money. For the other half a committee was released to visit the Near East Relief, where the sum was asked for in the form of a loan. As the loan was not made, the merchants returned to prison, and were later released, after giving promissory notes to pay the sum.

"Is this a case of profiteering?" questioned one of the trustees.

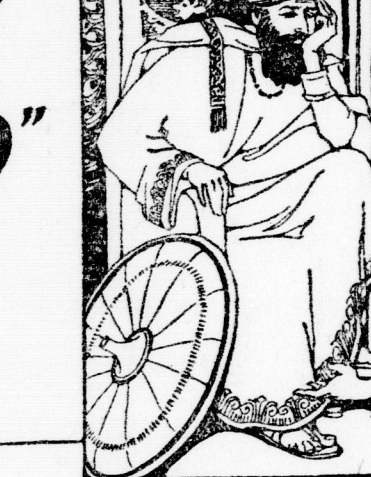
