LIKELY TO APPEAL

Grand Trunk May Not Accept Penny-a-Mile Order.

COMMISSION'S JUDGMENT

Company Directed to Put on Third-Class Carriages in Connection With One Toronto-Montreal Train Daily—Order Not to Take Effect Pending Decision of Appeal If One Is Entered.

Ottawa, July 31.—The Railway Commission has given judgment directing the Grand Trunk to issue third-class tickets at the rate of one penny per mile, and upon the question whether passenger carriages attached to one train per day, each way, throughout the length of the line. The order is as follows:

(1) That the Grand Trunk Railway Co. run every day throughout the length of its line of railway, between Toronto and Montreal, at least one passenger train having on it third-class carriages for passenger traffic, and that the fare or charge for each third-class passenger by any train on that portion of the railway do not exceed two cents for each mile traveled, and that the said company forth- with, after the coming into effect of this order, file with the board of pas- senger tariffs for the aforesaid por- tion of its railway, embodying the said rate of two cents per mile for third-class passengers.

(2) That the G. T. R. be, and is hereby granted leave to appeal from this order to the Supreme Court of Canada, and upon the question whether that portion of section 3 of the aforesaid act of Parliament, which re- quired that the fare or charge for each third-class passenger by any train on the railway of said company should not exceed one penny a mile traveled, and that at least one train having on it third-class carriages should run every day throughout the length of the line of the said railway now in force.

(3) That in the event of an appeal from this order being entered for re- view at the next ensuing sitting of the Supreme Court, this order do not take effect until after the final disposition of the said appeal, but in the event of such an appeal being entered on or before the commencement of the said sitting, this order shall then im- mediately take effect.

A statement from Montreal is to the effect that the G. T. R. will take ad- vantage of the appeal clause in the order.

Used House for Fortifies.

Athens, July 31.—There has been a pitched battle between Turkish troops, supported by Bashibazouks, and a small band of Greek insurgents, who had entrenched themselves in a house in the outskirts of Sarva, Euro- pean Turkey (60 miles northwest of Saloniki). The band was completely wiped out, but 30 men were killed be- fore the soldiers, aided by artillery, succeeded in capturing the miniature fortress.

During the fighting the Bashibazouks pillaged over a hundred houses and burned a number of Greek build- ings in Sarva.

T. & N. O. Report.

Toronto, July 31.—The May report of the T. & N. O. Railway Commis- sion was issued yesterday by Provin- cial Treasurer Matheson. The report shows:

Receipts, \$77,041; disbursements, \$51,496; profit, \$25,545.

The expenses include \$8,312 paid for insurance.

Passenger traffic brought in \$40,027 and freight traffic \$30,542. The num- ber of miles in operation was 138.9, as against 119 miles a year ago.

Taft for President.

Columbus, Ohio, July 31.—At the meeting of the State Republican Cen- tral Committee yesterday a resolu- tion was adopted endorsing Secretary Taft for the Presidency by a vote of 15 to 6. An amendment, proposed by the friends of Taft and opposed by Foraker men, was adopted by a vote of 11 to 10, saying in effect that there is no intention to eliminate Senators Foraker or Dick from pol- itics in Ohio.

Commissioner's Busy Year.

Ottawa, July 31.—The Secretary of the Railway Commission says that the annual report is almost ready for publication.

During the last twelve months the Commission considered 1,200 applica- tions, as compared with 600 during the previous twelve months, an in- crease of 200 per cent.

Insane Man on Train.

New York, July 31.—Frederick Ford of Philadelphia became insane in a train after leaving Albany yesterday and made several efforts to kill his two-year-old daughter by throwing her from a window of the train. He was restrained by other passengers. Ford also tried to leap from the train.

Criminal Appeal.

London, July 31.—The House of Commons after an all-night sitting passed the third reading of the bill establishing a court of criminal ap- peal, and providing for the right of appeal against convictions for crime, similar to that now existing in civil cases.

Boy Drowned.

Kingsport, July 31.—An immigrant youth of 18 was riding horses across a long bar from Big Island to An- son's Island, when the horse, accom- panied by the boy, was swept over- board by the fast by a wave and the boy drowned.

Elections in Philippines.

Manila, July 31.—The independence factions that united in the campaign under the name of the Nationalists, appear to have won the general elec- tion held throughout the islands yes- terday.

TROOPS AGAINST STRIKERS.

Cameron Highlanders Arrive at Bel- fast With Maxim Gun.

Belfast, July 31.—The authorities view seriously the local situation arising from the strike of the dock laborers for increased pay and short- er hours, which has been aggravated by the revolt of the police, who are demanding more pay because of the extreme work the strike entails, is evidenced by the arrival here yester- day of the first battalion of the Cam- eron Highlanders, with a Maxim gun and a detachment of cavalry.

In addition the 13th Hussars are now on their way into Belfast, and the Berkshire and Middlesex Regi- ments have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to move at a moment's notice.

Special camp accommodations are being provided and it is expected that a total of 6,000 troops will be in Belfast within a few days.

At Cork the police are in full sym- pathy with the Belfast force and have asked the permission of the inspector- general to hold a public meeting.

RESULTS AT PETAWAWA.

Canada Won Londonderry and Prince of Wales' Cups.

Petawawa Camp, July 31.—The results of the artillery competitions were announced last night.

The Canadian composite team has won the Londonderry Challenge Cup and the Prince of Wales' Cup on the aggregate score.

The results were: British 549 in field artillery and 507 in heavy; Cana- dian 524 in field and 488 in heavy.

The Canadian heavy artillery team yesterday morning made an excellent showing, surprising many by the ac- curacy with which they carried over the firing and maneuvering. Major Leigh was battery commander in the direct firing, with Capt. McKinnon, Commandant of the section, and in direct firing, Capt. Ewing command- ed, aided by Lieut. McGowan.

Lord Strathbrooke and Countess Strathbrooke were present, and along with the party was Major Tanaka, Japanese artillery attaché to the em- bassy at Washington.

RESTRICTING EMIGRATION.

Jap Government to Consider Meas- ures of Limitation.

Ottawa, July 31.—The Japanese Government has under consideration the further limitation of Japanese emigration, and as a means to this end, which is in pursuance of its own national policy, welcomes the proposed limitation of immigration of Japanese into this country.

The present arrangement is that not more than one passport per month will be issued for each of the 40 dis- tricts of Japan to those wishing to emigrate to Canada. This number has not been reached.

However, the difficulty in the an- ticipated large immigration to Canada from Honolulu, includes Japs who are United States citizens and over whom Japan has now no control. An arrangement will thus have to be come to with the United States Gov- ernment.

Off for South Pole.

London, July 31.—The English south polar expedition sailed yesterday for King Edward VII. Land, where the party of twelve will spend the winter.

The equipment includes a motor- car provided with different sets of runners for travel over surfaces of varying nature, twelve Siberian ponies and 34 dogs. Several scientists, with elaborate apparatus, accompany the expedition.

Francisco, Belgium are also send- ing expeditions.

Escapes From Hospital.

Barrie, July 31.—Simon Marshall of Lindsay, who was brought to Barrie Hospital by the Orillia police on Fri- day morning, suffering from pneu- monia, disappeared from the institu- tion at midnight. His own clothes had been put out of his reach, but he managed to secure a youth's coat and pants and made his escape through a back door. He was wanted on suspicion of being implicated in the Algonquin Park fur smuggling case.

Divides Estate Among Employees.

New York, July 31.—The will of John C. Wilson, who was shot in his office, by John Warren, director of his business and \$100,000 personal estate be divided, share and share alike, between employees and Bernard J. Mann, the lawyer's father, who had been a friend of the deceased for many years.

Salaries Too Small.

Windsor, July 31.—Hon. R. F. Sutherland announced yesterday that all efforts to obtain larger pay or a higher age limit for letter-carriers had failed.

It is probable that free delivery will not be given Windsor for a long time, as few men wish to work for \$1.25 a day.

Big Cheque for Province.

Toronto, July 31.—The estate of the late Senator George T. Falford has paid to the Treasury Department of the province a cheque for \$106,000. This with \$250,000 makes a total of \$356,000.

The estate was assessed at \$2,745,000, not including charities and debts.

Guide to Mariners.

Kingsport, July 31.—The Government has established a steel cylindrical gas buoy, painted red and surmounted by a pyramidal steel frame, supporting a lantern on the southern side of the Northport shoal, in the Bay of Quinte.

Schmitt Still Mayor.

San Francisco, July 31.—Eugene Schmitt, the convicted mayor, has made arrangements to fill the vacan- cy created by the forced resignation of fourteen members of the board of supervisors.

Gored by a Bull.

Ottawa, July 31.—Frank Zevitski, an employee of Aaron Wright, M. P., was badly gored by a Jersey bull at Renfrew. He escaped by crawling through a hedge.

BIG LEGAL FIGHT ON

Struggle Between Dominion Coal and Steel.

VAN HORNE WAS SUSPICIOUS

Says He Mistrusted President Ross—Was the Steel Company Justified in Refusing Coal and Was the Coal Company Justified in Breaking Contract?—The Main Issues—Sir William on the Stand.

Sydney, N. S., July 31.—The legal struggle between the two great cor- porations—the Dominion Steel and the Dominion Coal—to decide whether the Steel Company was justified in breaking its contract with the Coal Company, began yesterday. There was a large attendance in court, Judge Longley is presiding. Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, K. C. of Toronto, is leading counsel for the Steel Company, and H. A. Lovitt, K. C. of Halifax, for the Coal interests.

The features of yesterday's evidence was that given by Sir William Van Horne, who, in telling of his con- nection with the companies, acknowl- edged that he distrusted President Ross (head of both companies).

"My feeling against Mr. Ross was caused by an old business transac- tion. Superficially we have been on friendly terms. I felt I had been cheated by Mr. Ross. The merits were all on my side," said Sir William. Trouble between them dated back eight years.

"I have been heart and soul with the Coal Company. My trouble with Mr. Ross made me feel I could not trust the Coal Company to the mer- cies of Mr. Ross.

"I was with the Steel people be- cause I believe they were in the right. Before the contract was made enquir- ies as to the quality of the coal ne- cessary for the making of steel."

W. F. White, general manager of the National Trust, declared that con- sent had never been given to either of the contending companies for the cancellation of the contract.

F. P. Jones, general manager of the Steel Company since 1901, said that just prior to October, 1903, the date of the contract, there were five collieries on the Thelon seam. So long as the Steel Company there was no other mines known to be on the Thelon seam. The greater portion of the coal supplied before the contract came from these five. There was no official notice given to designate any particular seam. The coal at first was fairly well adapted for steel purposes. In the autumn of 1904, they sent coal which he refused because it was slack. About 30 cars were rejected and the Coal Company took them all back. Some coal that came desig- nated as No. 2 run of mine, was not run of mine at all, but slack.

No Bail for Pettibone.

Boise, Idaho, July 31.—Formal ap- plication was made in the District Court yesterday to have George A. Pettibone admitted to bail. The mo- tion was submitted without argument, and was promptly denied by Judge Wood. It was announced that bond for Charles H. Moyer would be ready by noon. It is in course of prepara- tion, and will be signed by Timothy Reagan, president of the First Na- tional Bank of Boise. The bond is guaranteed by \$25,000 cash on deposit by the Butte, Mont. local of the Western Federation of Miners.

Prohibition Bill Adopted.

Atlanta, Ga., July 31.—The Hard- man-Govington prohibition bill passed by the Senate some days ago was adopted by the House last night by a vote of 118 to 39.

Two amendments made yesterday permit the sale of alcohol by whole- sale druggists on the prescription of a reputable physician, and also al- lows wholesale druggists to carry pure alcohol in stock for sale to retailers only.

The new law is to become effective Jan. 1, 1908.

Involuntary Manslaughter.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., July 31.—The verdict of a coroner's jury in the case of Miss Elizabeth Cronshaw, of Fergus, Ont., who was shot and killed by Pte. Cyrus Gillette, who was aiming at a deserter, charges him with involuntary manslaughter.

A demand will be made on officers at Fort Brady for the man, which probably will be refused until a court- martial is held. This will likely ac- quit Gillette.

Missionaries Drown.

New Haven, Conn., July 31.—Ad- vices received here from Kuling, Chi- na, state that Rev. Warren B. Sea- bury, Yale, 1900, and Rev. Arthur S. Mann, 1899, have both been drowned. The latter met his death in attempting to rescue Dr. Seabury.

Little Girl Suicides.

Detroit, July 31.—Fearful lest she would be whipped for having dropped a bunch of keys into the river, little Emma Blumens, aged 12, a daughter of August Blumens, Baldwin avenue, 18th ward, threw herself into the River Rouge, and was drowned.

175 Degrees in the Sun.

McGregor, Tex., July 31.—The most terrific heat visitation ever known in Texas occurred here, continuing about an hour and twenty minutes. The thermometer registered 175 degrees in the sun and 117 degrees in the shade.

Woman Drowns in Creek.

Uxbridge, July 31.—Mrs. Wilkin, probably 75 years of age, was found drowned yesterday morning with her head and shoulders in a small pond, that empties into the electric light pond.

A Titled "Drummer."

Detroit, July 31.—Lord Shallo Doug- las, son of the Marquis of Queens- bury, has taken a job as drummer for a local jewelry house.
