





Washington, July 2 .- The chief of ceased was secretary of the Preston ordnance of the U.S. navy has recently been under the necessity of purchasing 2,000 Krag-Jorgensens for use on shipboard, a rather unusual circumstance, considering the fact that this type of gun has been officially declared obsolete in the army. The explanation is to be found in the lack of funds to supply the entire navy with the new army rifle or Springfield of 1903. Already there is on shipboard the Krag and the old type Lee rifle, and it is regarded as inadvisable to have in use at the same

time three kinds of small arms, with all sorts of possibilities of confusion in the handling of ammunition for them.

Therefore, not being able to buy the 25,000 rifles of the 1903 pattern, which would be necessary to arm the sailors and marines, the naval authorities were obliged to purchase the Krag in a limited number to make good the deficiency.
