ALLIANCE GOLD BRICK IS LORD'S DAY BILL

Minister of Justice Discriminates Against Grimsby Park for Montreal Resorts

(Special Staff Correspondence).
Ottawa, July 2.—This morning's lively tilt between Mr. Lancaster and the minister of justice was a fitting wind-up to the Lord's Day observance "gold brick," which the Government have succeeded in passing upon the Alliance people. The member for Lincoln protested strongly that religious gatherings were absolutely being discriminated against and suppressed, where a charge was made for admission, while it was left open to provincial legislatures to except Sunday work or crime against the decalogue from police interference.

It was noticed that Mr. Aylesworth went out of his way to stab Grimsby Park, by preventing its becoming amenable to local legislation, while Schomer and Dominion Parks in the City of Montreal are allowed to charge for admission, but not to have meetings. In other words, the people of Montreal may enter Schomer and walk or sit around telling stories and chewing tobacco by paying at the door, but the people shall not hold a religious or other meeting at Grimsby on the same terms.

What is the motion underlying this action? Grimsby has received high Methodist sanction, though not from conference. Nothing is gained for religion by stopping the meetings, because the cottagers will have either to stay away from prayer meetings or drive several miles to a church. In the latter case they are put to great inconvenience while compelling both man and beast to work on Sunday. The net result will be to close the park to any kind of public meeting where a charge is made, and thus to "throw it down" as an investment for those who have backed it financially. Back of it all some think they discern a sop to Quebec to procure the bill's acceptance, as the Church in that province is against religious meetings elsewhere than in the Lord's house.

Mr. Lancaster gave the minister a lively verbal castigation, accusing him of sneering at people because they want to go to church or enter a park to attend religious services instead of to play games.

Honorable senators may well complain that they will be given only a day or two at most to pass upon this Lord's Day measure, while the House has taken months for its consideration.

It is unlikely that the bill, which has been altered and amended so far that Mr. R. L. Borden confessed at the last hour of its second reading this morning that he could not understand it, and asked that it be reprinted, will receive the consideration in the Red Chamber that the subject merits. Nor is it probable that it will be quashed or held over, but will be accepted as it has been delivered. The suggestion that its not going into force until March next was in order to give the provinces a chance to "knock it out" was received with much merriment amidst a strong exhibition of feeling in general amongst the members.

The division of opinion among ministers themselves was very noteworthy. In Wednesday's division the premier and the minister of justice voted against each other, and in another instance ministers stood four against three, a House pretty evenly divided against itself with bad binding in the walls thereof.

If the Senate, given a fair opportunity, could not do better than the ministerial party on this issue, it is deserving of all the mean things said by present members of that honorable body who were formerly its enemies. As a matter of fact, it contains some of the best intellectual furnishings that belong to Parliament, while the physical vigor displayed by members considered on the list of "aged" is something marvelous. To hear Sir Mackenzie Bowell in debate or see him striding over the grounds with firm, elastic step and shoulders up, one would never dream he was an octogenarian. London's "grand old man" likewise presents a strong figure, moving actively about, a tower of personal influence and possessing the highest respect of all. While not taking a lead among the debating contingent, Sir John Carling and the Hon. R. W. Scott, secretary of state, have the distinction of being the two oldest survivors among members of Parliament at the time of Confederation. Senator Scott, while in the eighties, is still hale and vigorous, and well resigned to the cares of a congenial office in the Government, and as leader in the Senate, a fine fruit of careful regimen lifelong.

It is said the veteran statesman never eats meat, nor takes medicine, because he never needs any. He may balk in his tally of past phases of history in which he was not concerned, but seems most unusually alert to present day issues, and apparently has no need to sympathize with any opinion expressed against his ability to lead the Senate for years to come. "The London Free Press," he said to your representative, "Let's see, didn't Tom White once have something to do with it? Oh, no, now I remember. It was Josiah Blackburn who started it. White went from Peterboro'. A good, spicy paper all around," the senator went on, reflectively. I like it, though I don't much admire its politics."

Senator Frost does not come in the "aged" list. He is a good sample, however, of the senators in middle life or thereabouts who impart intellectual vigor and the proceeds of a very wide range of information to the senatorial proceedings, one of the clearest-headed of our Parliament men. Diverging from a ten minutes' talk on the tariff question in a company which included Sir John Carling, in one of the side rooms,

Senator Frost compared the prosperity of the times in the United States and Canada, the point being that Canadians were becoming as well off in general as the people on the other side, and as capable of buying the best goods for their use. Our farmers, he said, are better off now than ever before in the country's history. And how has it been done? Why, principally by improved methods, the result of better information spread among them.

"And I will say this," Senator Frost went on, "that Sir John Carling, sitting there, is the man who did more in his time than any one else to help them; I mean by the Experimental Farm that was started under his management. It has brought harmony out of confusion. Farmers now know better than they ever did before that in-stitution was set going, what they are about. But it was at first up-hill work to get the agriculturists to take it up as they should do. At first they thought, many of them, that it was all just 'book farming,' as they called it, 'bulletin farming.' All this was the effect of old prejudice, and too much caution in accepting new things. Now I can tell you that they fully realize all over the country that the Experimental Farm has done more than anything else for their good. They flock to the farmers' meetings, listen attentively to the lectures, and read up all that is given out to them. That is what has made the farmers prosper," said Senator Frost, emphatically, "and the farmers have to thank our old friend, Sir John, for his share in it." As Senator Frost is the head of a great implement firm in Canada, what he says on farming is entitled to great weight on this point.

DRUNKEN GUARDS FIRE UPON MINERS

Bloody Result of Misunderstanding Consequent Upon Careless Gunning

Dillon Vale, O., July 2.—Investigation by the authorities of the miners' riot at Bradley, Ohio, yesterday shows that one man is dead, two are fatally, while several others are seriously wounded.

At noon yesterday twenty guards employed at Plum Run marched into Bradley and engaged in drinking at one of the company houses. Subsequently five of them came out and fired their guns in the air.

The guards stationed across the ravine imagined the miners were attacking the guards and fired upon the strikers, whereupon the strikers retaliated. The guards then crossed the ravine and attacked the strikers with fearful results.

Dead and Wounded.
Those shot were James Bertam, wounded in leg.
James Fiske, a paralytic, shot through head, and eye shot out.
Wm. Williams, wounded in shoulder.
Mike Smith, shot through the stomach and will die.
Frank Ostreski, shot through stomach; died this morning.

Farmers in the vicinity of Bradley appealed to Sheriff Vorhees today for protection against the guards, claiming that their stock is shot down in the fields and other depredations committed by the non-residents.

The situation here is worse than at any time since the strike was inaugurated.

PLOT AGAINST POLICE

Two Shot Down and Three Mortally Wounded in Warsaw, Russia.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, July 2.—The recent rumors to the effect that the terrorists were organizing a general slaughter of the police were partially corroborated to-day, when two policemen were shot dead and three were mortally wounded simultaneously in various parts of the city. In consequence of the attacks made on the police, the latter have been withdrawn from the streets, which are now patrolled by infantry.

DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS LOADED.

Springfield, Mass., July 2.—Elder Brunelle, 13 years old, was accidentally shot and killed last evening by Charles Barcome, 17 years old, who was trying a new revolver purchased for Fourth of July celebrations.

Barcome thought he had only blank cartridges, but after the shooting recollected that some one had given him a cartridge, which, it appears, now contained a bullet. Barcome is in a hysterical condition as a result of the accident.

PRESTON HORSEMAN DIES.

Preston, Ont., July 2.—One of Waterloo County's best known horsemen passed away here Saturday night in the person of Purves Lawerson, proprietor of the Preston Livery and Training Stables.

Death was due to typhoid fever. Deceased was secretary of the Preston Springs Racing Association.

JAILED FOR CONTEMPT.

Toledo, July 2.—Judge Kinkade today sentenced Clarence Brown and T. H. Tracy, attorneys for the ice men, to ten days each in jail for contempt.

FEMALE TERMAGANT KILLS STEP-CHILD

Girl Beaten to Death With a Stick Filled With Nails

Chicago, July 2.—A despatch from Youngstown, Ohio, says: The discovery of a six-year-old Elsie Anderson had died of wounds on her body, apparently the result of a beating with a stick filled with nails, was followed by the arrest of her step-mother, Janie Anderson. She was very nervous, and beyond admitting that she had beaten the child frequently in the last three weeks, refused to talk.

Physicians who examined the body of the child declared that she had been beaten to death. The body presents a horrible sight. From the top of the head to the soles of the feet there are not four inches of skin not punctured with what are believed to be nail holes or covered with ugly wounds. One arm and a shoulder were broken.

Neighbors say that for three weeks the woman has kept the child hidden from her father. When the father returned to his home at night the little one was shut up in the attic. Marks on her arms indicate that she was tied with ropes.

JEROME HAS RETURNED

Renewed Impetus Given to Murder Tragedy by His Presence.

New York, July 2.—With the return of District Attorney Jerome from his vacation in the country, the investigation into the Thaw-White tragedy was given renewed impetus today. Attaches of the district attorney's office had been engaged in whipping into shape the information concerning the case already at hand and everything was in preparation to be submitted to the chief upon his arrival.

Thaw passed a very comfortable night in his cell in the Tombs, and today appeared to be in better condition than at any time since he was arrested for shooting Stanford White, a week ago today. The prisoner's wife called at the usual hour today and spent some time with him.

NEW CANAL COMMISSION

President Roosevelt Not Deterred by Senate's Opposition.

Washington, July 2.—Because of the failure of the senate to confirm the Isthmian Canal commission President Roosevelt has named a new commission, consisting of Theodore P. Shonts, chairman; John F. Stevens, Governor Charles E. Magoon, Brigadier-General Peter Hains, U. S. A., retired; Mordecai Endicott, civil engineer, U. S. N.; and Benjamin M. Harrod, members.

Mr. Stevens replaces Brigadier Oswald H. Ernst, who retired from active service in the army last week and will hereafter devote practically his entire time to the international waterways commission. Joseph Bucklin Bishop, who was secretary to the old commission and a member of the commission, will be secretary to the new body, but not one of its members.

The salaries of the members will continue as heretofore. Mr. Stevens will continue as chief engineer of the commission, but will not receive any extra compensation for his services as a member of the commission.

PURCHASE OF OLD GUNS

Chief of U. S. Navy Buys 3,000 Obsolete Arms.

Washington, July 2.—The chief of ordnance of the U. S. navy has recently been under the necessity of purchasing 2,000 Krag-Jorgensen for use on shipboard, a rather unusual circumstance, considering the fact that this type of gun has been officially declared obsolete in the army. The explanation is to be found in the lack of funds to supply the entire navy with the new army rifle or Springfield of 1902. Already there is on shipboard the Krag and the old type Lee rifle, and it is regarded as inadvisable to have in use at the same time three kinds of small arms, with all sorts of possibilities of confusion in the handling of ammunition for them.

Therefore, not being able to buy the 25,000 rifles of the 1903 pattern, which would be necessary to arm the sailors and marines, the naval authorities were obliged to purchase the Krag in a limited number to make good the deficiency.
