MADRID, April 4.—Prim has asked the Cortes to grant a contingent of 80,000 men for the army for the current year.

PARIS, April 4.—A demolition of the walls of the fortress of Luxembourg is commenced.

MADRID, April 5.—A majority of the Cortes and Council ministers favor Ferdinand for King. A committee including Olaguer have gone to Lisbon to request his acceptance.

NEW YORK, April 5.—A Tribune special says the Spanish Cortes asked the Ministry for the documents relative to the goods said to have been imported for commerce by Minister Hale and the diplomatic franchise.

LONDON, April 5.—In the House of Commons a bill abolishing imprisonment for debt was passed to second reading.

PARIS, April 6.—The election for members of the Corps Legislatif commences on the 30th of May.

HALIFAX, April 6.—The Newfoundland seal fisheries are doing well.

Inte despatches from the Colonial Office to Prince Edward Island caution the Government against reciprocity negotiations, and informing them that they must pay the Governor's salary—have created much dissatisfaction. All the papers denounce the proceedings as unjust, and maintain that as the British Government had appropriated all the public lands of the Island they should pay the Governor's salary.

SOUTH AMERICA. LONDON, April 6.—The mail steamer from Rio Janeiro says that Palanbos, the Brazilian Commissioner to Paraguay, had arrived at Asencion and was endeavoring to bring the war to a close. He had made preparations for peace on the following conditions: The independence of Paraguay to be unimpeded; free navigation on the La Plata and Lopez rivers to be guaranteed; and that Lopez renounced all claims to the position of Gaschaco Territory and the province of Matagrasa.

OTTAWA, April 6.—The great billiard match of 2000 points, between Dion and Foster, was won by Dion by 850 points.

OTTAWA, April 5.—Information has reached the Hudson Bay Co. that Montreal is to consider the proposition for compensation for all their claims. The Company agreed to accept the offer. The Canadians are believed to be on their return home.

CHICAGO, April 5.—Charles Spowdown Fairfax, of California, died yesterday at Barren's Hotel, Baltimore. He will be buried to-morrow by the Masonic fraternity in Rock Island Cemetery, a few miles from Washington.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—In the Senate, Chandler called up the bill authorizing the New York and New Foundland Telegraph Company to land their cable on the United States Coast, and moved an amendment extending the same provision to any company chartered by any State.

CHICAGO, April 7.—The Tribune special says that the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations has agreed to report favorably on the Darien Ship Canal and the Sandwich Island treaties. Probably these, as well as the Alabama treaty will go over to the Executive Session.

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HAVANA, April 5.—The Diario considers the rebellion in the Central Department entirely suppressed. The flag ship Canterwell has gone to the mouth of the Mississippi to intercept the expedition reported as sailing for Cuba from New Orleans.

AFRICA. London, April 4.—An Alexandria despatch says another attempt to assassinate the Viceroy of Egypt has been discovered and frustrated; a loaded bomb was found under his chair in the theatre and removed before it exploded. A large number of suspected persons have been arrested.

SAN DOMINGO. HAVANA, April 3.—San Domingo advices of the 27th of March report that an American war steamer was cooling in the Bay of Samana. Great excitement prevailed throughout the Island. The Dominicans are unwilling to part with the territory.

NEVADA. VIRGINIA CITY, April 7.—Fire was discovered in the Yellow Jacket, Crown Point and Kentucky mines. Gold Hill, early this morning, and is now raging. Seventeen men are thought to be in the mines. Five dead bodies have been brought to the surface. Great fears are entertained that the men remaining below have all perished; the smoke and gas being so dense as to preclude any attempt to get to their aid, or to extinguish the fire.

VIRGINIA CITY, April 7.—The excitement is so great that it is difficult to get full and exact particulars of the Gold Hill fire. It originated from a miner's candle. But little can be done. The dense smoke filling all the galleries and passages on the level where the fire originated and those above, prevented any direct efforts being made to extinguish the fire. Four more bodies were found dead in the Yellow Jacket. There are 25 men in the Crown Point below the fire supposed to be dead. From ten to twelve in the Kentucky are also all supposed to be dead. Efforts are being made to get them out through both tunnels and shafts, but the smoke is so dense that men cannot live to go down. Notes and signals sent down by the carrier failed to return any response.
