Complete Description of the Plant of the National E. T. & L. Company.

The Tramway Company Successfully Started Their Lighting System Last Evening.

OROW'S NEST AND E. OTENAY LAKE R.R.

On motion of Cor. "ARER, the House went into committee on the act to amend the Crow's Nest & Kootenay Lake Railway Company's Act, Mr. Kitchen fi the chair.

A long discussion ensued on the proposal of Hon. Mr. Beaven to introduce the Chinese clauses, the entire question being debated over again. The proposal was rejected on a vote of 16 to 13.

Hon. Mr. Beaven intimated that he should move the clauses when the bill was reported to the House for third reading.

The committee rose and reported the bill with amendments. The electric plant consists of two A 35 Thomson-Honston alternating current composite filled dynamos of 650 lights capacity each, and two small continuous dynamos of about five h. p. each, these last two being used to excite the field magnets on the larger machines. The dynamos are driven from a counter shaft, Schiesens perforated belts being used, these belts embody sev-
