

### FAMOUS STE ANNE DE BEAUPRE

Has Been the Mecca of Pilgrims for 250 Years—Founded by Mariners.

No visitor to Quebec should fail to make the trip to the far-famed shrine of Ste. Anne de Beupre or of "la Bonne Ste. Anne" as it is called, which can be accomplished in an hour by the comfortable and speedy steam and electric cars of the Quebec Railway, Light and Power Company. Ste. Anne de Beupre lies below the Falls of Montmorency, twenty-one miles from Quebec. For over 250 years it has been the mecca of devout pilgrims seeking restoration of health and miraculously obtaining it. Tradition relates that in the early part of the seventeenth century some Breton mariners who were overtaken by a violent storm while navigating the St. Lawrence, solemnly vowed to Ste. Anne that if delivered from the dangers which encompassed them, they would erect a sanctuary in her honor on the spot on which they should land. Their prayers being heard, they built a small wooden chapel in fulfillment of their vows which has since become famous and which then, as now, bore the same name. The primitive little church was replaced by a larger structure in 1660 which subsequently rebuilt and enlarged, finally gave way to a magnificent edifice (since destroyed by fire) which was raised to the dignity of a Basilica by Pope Pius IX. It is a fine specimen of Corinthian architecture and is of immense proportions. A colossal statue of Ste. Anne of marvelous beauty surmounts the facade between twin towers rising to a great height. The interior of the sacred edifice rivals the most famous cathedral in the world in beauty and imposing grandeur. On each side of the entrance are large pyramids of crutches and canes and trusses and splints left by former owners as mute testimony of the saint's intervention on their behalf. There is also another statue of Ste. Anne, resting on a column of white marble, to which some deeply venerated relics were attached—a fragment of the finger bone of the saint procured by Mgr. Laval, the first Bishop of New France; a part of the saint's wrist sent by Pope Leo XIII; and a portion of the rock from the grotto in which Ste. Anne gave birth to the Virgin Mary. The "sacred stairs," which the zealous supplicants ascend upon their knees, is built in imitation of Pilate's Palace at Jerusalem and the magnificent painting and statuary represent the life of Christ from Bethlehem to Calvary. Thousands of tourists visit Ste Anne de Beupre, impelled by the curious scenes witnessed there and the costly works of art possessed by the sanctuary and the high esteem in which the patron saint is held is shown by the remarkable increase in the perennial pilgrimages to her shrine.

In 1884 there were 17,000 visitors; in 1894, 61,000; in 1899, 100,000; in 1905, 130,000; in 1912, 150,000 and in 1919, 1,399,008 which number is largely increased every year. Formerly the pilgrimages were from the Province of Quebec only, but now they are from the other provinces of Canada and from the United States. Good hotel accommodation is provided for visitors. The celebrated Cycloorama of Jerusalem, the day of the Crucifixion in permanent exhibition at Ste Anne de Beupre since 1905. Is regarded as a masterpiece of Panoramic painting, the most remarkable on the American continent. The great scene of the death of Christ on the Cross and the City of Jerusalem, reproduced by a master hand on a circular canvas 45 feet high and 360 feet in circumference. Tourists and pilgrims while in this town should not fail to visit one of the greatest wax work exhibitions in the world in the Royal Museum. One of the most wonderful groups is: The first old French Canadian couple who resided in Ste Anne two hundred and fifty years ago, with the antiquities of the place at the time. This couple lived during a century in a little stone house opposite the old church. Besides other models of art you see the martyrdom of Louis Guimont, the first cure of Ste Anne in the year 1658; he placed three small stones in the foundation of the first church and was instantly cured. One of the most wonderful pieces of fine art in America is "The Last Supper." This Last Supper is a masterpiece reproduced

### CONVICT'S ART MAY FREE HIM

His Interpretation of Christ Ministering to Helpless Is Claimed Masterpiece.

Atlanta, June 6.—An oil painting of Christ ministering to the helpless, placed on the wall of the chapel of the United States penitentiary here by Max Sasanoff, Russian artist and opera singer, may be the means of obtaining for him a complete pardon from serving the remainder of a three-year sentence for conviction in a counterfeiting case in New York City.

Max has just finished the picture, and it took him from the first of last December until May 10 to complete it—almost six months of intensive effort. According to Father Hayden, rector of the chapel, who, Max says, inspired the painting, he worked on it every day from early in the morning until they compelled him to stop at night.

"Sometimes at 8, and even 9 o'clock at night, I would find Max in the chapel, laboring over his work, and I almost had to drag him away from it," said Father Hayden. "He was so enthusiastic over it, and so intent on finishing it, that he thought nothing of working right through mealtime unless some one came by and made him quit and eat. He seemed never to tire, but wanted to work all the time."

**Picture Painted on Wall**  
The picture measures 8 feet wide by 15 feet tall, painted directly on the wall of the Catholic chapel. It depicts the Saviour standing on the rose-strewn steps of a temple, while all about Him are gathered in supplication, the sick in body and sick in soul, the beggars and the blind and the wayward youth, while the hand of the Master rests on the head of the Magdalene. Above in the clouds sits three cherubim, symbolize, the artist says, of the Angel of Mercy.

It is painted in all and has elicited high praise from art critics. Prisoners furnished the models for Max. So interested were they that many of them sat for hours at a time. Max says that without their co-operation he never could have carried the picture to a successful completion.

"Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest," is the text that furnished the theme for the painting.

Max is of Russian-Italian heritage, having been born in Italy. His mother is an Italian, while his father is a Russian Jew. He is of diminutive stature, standing barely over five feet tall, and of a decided rotundity. He has bright black eyes and the manners of a well bred and well read foreigner.

He was educated in the schools of Moscow, attending and being graduated from the Moscow University. Later he studied art and music in Paris and other European art centres.

Besides being an artist of note he is an opera singer of recognized ability, having sung with the late Enrico Caruso and the Russian Chaliapin.

Max first came into prominence locally by his concert broadcast over a local station. He has a fine tenor voice and created much favorable comment from music critics of New York by his work in operas presented by the Metropolitan company during the two years he was with them.

Many Canvases Accepted.  
As an artist he has had many canvases accepted and hung in various galleries. He also has painted many portraits in oil and aquarel, and his best known work, a painting of the World War, now hangs in the Congressional Library in Washington. Many thousands of copies of this canvas were printed and distributed during the war.

"Max should get a pardon," Father Hayden said. "An investigation has shown that he was ignorant of what he was doing when he made a plate to be used in counterfeiting money, and I honestly believe that he is innocent of any crime. He says that when he did find out that what he was
