The suspension of the Evening Canadian last night is our reason for referring to the newspaper situation in Toronto. For nearly four years a bitter newspaper war has been raging in this city.

But the war among the evening papers raged with all the more fury. In 1882 still another entered the field, the Evening Canadian. The Globe became frantic and did anything and everything to hold its circulation.

There is the Globe published as a morning paper at three cents, with one cent editions at twelve o'clock, three o'clock, five o'clock.

As for the Mail it has one merit: it confines its energy to the morning field and tries to keep up rates for subscriptions. It has, however, to cut its advertising prices and has never yet earned a cent for its proprietors from the day of its inception to the present moment.

The advertising public for patronage to fill these big sheets in their morning and their evening editions. Hundreds of dollars are weekly being thrown away into advertisements in double numbers, big papers, etc.
