THE BAPTIST CONVERTION.

Resolution Against Exemptions, Ottawa, Oct. 18.—At the Baptist Convention to day Rev, John Malaurin, a returned missionary, presented the report of the Foreign Mission Board. The contribution from churches and ladies' societies during the year was \$20,115, leaving a balance in hand of 51697. Six new missionaries were sunt to foreign fields last year.

Woodstock was chosen as the place of the next meeting and the district secretaries no minuted by the various associations were elected.

This resolution was moved by Mr. D. E. Thomson and seconded by the Rev. John McLaurin:
