THE STARVING IRISH POOR

A FORCE ONE HUNDRED STRONG DEFY THE POLICE.

Have Only Earned a Shilling in Six Months—Died While Dancing an Irish Jig-Cabinet Crisis in Portugal-Genera

CORK, Jan. 9.-While a meeting of the Board of Guardians of Clonakilly was in progress to-day a mob of about 100 labor-ers from the seacoast neighborhood suddenly broke in on the board. Heedless of remonstrances and of the show of resistance made by the police the laborers insisted upon having a hearing. The guardians finally consented to listen to the spokesman of the party. The latter said that they and their families were literally starving, and that they had individually not been able to earn a shilling in six months. They demanded work and told the guardians that they were driven to desperation by the suffering they and their families endured. The guardians promised to do their utmost to relieve the distress, but the means of the guardians are limited.
