1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether in his name or anothers, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay up all arrears, or the pub-lisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or

3. In suits for subscriptions, the suit may be instituted in the place where the paper is amblished, although the subscriber may re-nds hundreds of miles away.


Rev. R. Brooking, an old Methodist minister residing at Cobourg, died this week. He was well and favorably known throughout the province.




