The statutory law on the question is set forth in Chapter 136 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1887, sections 5, 6 and 7. This Statute has since been frequently amended. In 1888 an A 1 was passed to remove any doubt as to whether chapter 130 applied to friendly societies. In 1899 and 1890 the sections mentioned were still turther amended so that they now read as follows.
