REORGANIZATION of the Reserve Militia is now nearly complete and before very long Canada will be in possession of the most complete militia system ever devised on this continent. Upon the merits of the details of this law it is not our present purpose to enter, as we are well convinced that the time has not yet come when the wisdom of the measure will be acknowledged. Personally many of us who have labored in the volunteer cause feel aggrieved or neglected, but the question is not a personal one, it rests on its merits in a national sense, and we are bound as good citizens and soldiers to accept it, give it a fair trial, and if, after that, it is found inadequate, our duty will be to strive for something better.
