A. PALMER DUDLEY, M.D.

Dr. Palmer Dudley, a distinguished gynecologist of New York, died at Liverpool, England, July 15th, 1905, of pulmonary tuberculosis, aged 52. We are told by the Buffalo Medical Journal that Dr. Dudley attended the meeting of the Gynecological Society at Niagara Falls in May last looking the picture of health. He was on his way to St. Petersburg to attend the International Congress of Gynecology and Obstetrics as a delegate from the former society.

W. W. MEACHAM, M.D.

Dr. Meacham, of Warsaw, died at his residence, after a short illness, from apendicitis, aged sixty-four. He lived and practised for many years in Napanee, and represented his county for several years in the Outario Legislature. In politics he was a Conservatice, and in medical politics was inclined to support the "Defence Association."

FRED JAMES GANT, F.R.C.S.

Mr. Gant, well-known in former years as a great author and teacher of surgery, died in London, June 6th, aged 80. He went to the Crimea in 1854 as civil surgeon of the British military hospitals of the Crimea and Scutari. He was for more than fifty years connected with the Free Hospital in London.

S. R. VON BASCH, M.D.

Professor Von Basch, the well-known Professor of Explanatory Pathology in the University of Vienna, died April 5th, aged 68. He was at one time well-known on this continent as a physician to the unfortunate Kaiser Maximillian, who was shot in Mexico in 1867. In the latter part of the same year he returned to Europe with the body of the dead Emperor. He is said by those who knew him to have been a most able, energetic and lovable man.
