BY-LAWS OF THE

French Canadian Building Society OF MONTREAL.

ART. I.—This Society is called "THE FRENCH CANADIAN BUILDING SOCIETY OF MONTREAL." It is incorporated by virtue of Chapter 60 of the Consolidated Statutes of Lower Canada, en-titled: "An Act relating to Building Societies." ART. II.—The object of this Society is to offer to its members the means of requiring real

ART, III.—The duration of the Society is undetermined. We shall dissolve so soon as all the members thereof shall have received the amount of their shares.

Arr. IV.—The capital of the Society is divided into shares of Two hundred dollars each. These shares are subdivided into Books (Livrets), the number of which is fixed at Four hundred and fifty, each book to have no less than five shares, nor more than ten.

ART. V.—The moneys of the Society are appropriated: 1. For the payment of the necessary expenses

of management. 2. For the payment of the debts of the Society. 3. For the granting of appropriations to mem-

bers.

It shall, however, be lawful for the Directors to purchase books of the Society, or to loan apon the book guarantee of the Society, at such rates and conditions as to them may seem fit.

ART, VI.—The shares are payable at the office of the Society by weekly instalments of ten cents per share, without interruption, until the said weekly payments shall have reached the sum of sixty-two dollars and forty cents per share.

These payments shall be made every Monday These payments state of made every stonady between the hours of uine in the morning, and rive in the afternoon, or on any other day and hour that the Directors may fix upon.

Each shareholder, on paying twenty-five cents, shall be provided with a book, in which snall be entered his instalments, relimbars ements and

ART. VII.—All members in arrears shall be charged, and they shall pay a fine of two cents per share per week. One week of grace, however, shall be granted, and any shareholder in arrear may free himself from the fine, by paying in advance for as many weeks as he shall the Secretary-Treasurer in his duties, and to remove the fire shall the formation of the shall the formation of the shall the secretary-Treasurer in his duties, and to remove the fire shall the secretary-Treasurer in his duties, and to remove the fire shall be shall the secretary-Treasurer in his duties, and to remove the fire shall be shall be

ART, X.—No sharcholder can exact the remittance of his funds into the Society; he can only sell or transfer his shores.

ART, XI.—To that end, the Society shall keep a Book of Transfer, and no transfer shall be valid, unless it is previously signed by both the granter and the grantee and countersigned by the Socre-

and the grantee and countersigned by the Secretary-Treasurer.

No transfer shall be made unless the grantor has previously fulfilled all his obligations towards the Society, and the Society shall not be held to acknowledge any such transfer unless the same has been made in the form and on the conditions prescribed by the present Article.

ART. XII.—All shares and moneys generally of a member indebted to the Society for any cause whatsoever, shall be specially, and by privilege, applied to the payment of all the claims of the Society against him.

ART. XIII.—In case of the decease of any member, the latter shall be represented by his legal heirs.

member, the latter shall be represented by his legal heirs.

Att. XIV.—The appropriations shall be granted to members, by means of drawing by lot (tinge au sort), or sales to the highest bidder alternately. The mode, time and place of these drawings and sales shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Art. XV.—Whenever the state of the finances of the Society shall permit, the Directors shall declare a sale or drawing of an appropriation, and all shareholders shall be apprised of the same by a notice posted during two weeks within the office of the Society, and also advertised three times a week during two consecutive weeks, in two newspapers published in the French language.

Art. XVI.—One appropriation only is granted per book.

Airr. XVI.—One appropriation only is granted per book.

Airr. XVII.—Any shareholder who has become the purchaser of an appropriation, shall innuediately thereupon deposit into the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer a sum of twenty-five dollars for the purpose of securing to the society the execution of his obligations as such purchaser; and if the guarantees exacted and prescribed by Article XXI, are not given—at the expiration of a delay of two months—the Directors shall confiscate the said deposit to the profit of the Society.

The said deposit shall be returned to the purchaser, if the appropriation is granted to him.

The forfeiture of the \$25, shall replace the purchaser in the possession and enjoyment of

chaser in the possession and enjoyment of

all his rights.

Art. XVIII.—The shareholder who has obtained an appropriation, is held to re-imburse the amount of the same to the Society, without interest, in one hundred and twenty equal payments, monthly and consecutive, and the same shall be made at the office of the Society, beginning one month after he has taken possession of the appropriation or part of the same.

ART XIX.—On all monthly re imbursements, or any other sum owed to the Society, (the weekly instalments excepted,) which shall not be paid when due, a fine of two and a half per cent, per month, and for each month, shall be imposed and exacted, until complete payment. This fine may be avoided by paying in advance a number of re-imbursements equal to those in

a number of re-imbursements equal to those in arrear.

ART. XX.—If any shareholder is desirous of freeing himself from whatever he may be owing the society, either for weekly instalments or monthly reimbursements, before his obligations become due, he may do so by paying all arrears and tines due up to the day he has asked to be so freed, or on any other conditions, respecting his obligations in future, which the Directors may seem fit to determine.

ART. XXI.—Any member entitled to an appropriation shall, before the amount thereof is handed over to him, give an hypothecary guarantee, to the satisfaction of the Board of Directors, both for securing the reimbursement of the sum loaned, and for the guarantee of the weekly payments and the execution of all his other obligations towards the Society.

ART. XXII.—The expenses of valuation, examination of titles, and fees for Notary, Registrar and others, shall be borne by the shareholder.

XXIII.—The property mortgaged to the

XXIII.—The property mortgaged to the Society shall be secured for the benefit of the Society, at the expense of the shareholder, with such insurance company as the Directors may select.

ART. XXIV.—Any member having drawn an appropriation by lot who does not desire to get the amount thereof at once, may, within ten days after the drawing orsale of such appropriation, notify the Shcretary-Treasurer, that he is willing to receive the same later only.

In which case, when ready to receive the amount, he shall notify the Secretary-Treasurer to that effect; but all such appropriation as shall be granted or merely declared before this last notice, shall be paid out before his own; and he shall hegin his reimbursements one month after he shall have received his appropriation or any portion thereof

ART. XXV.—Any member entitled to an appropriation, who desires to leave the amount thereof into the hands of the Society during a certain time, shall have a right to an interest equal to that received by the Society from its own banker. But he shall be bound to make his payments regularly in the same manner as if he had received the amount of his appropriations.

ART. XXVI.—The affairs of the Society are managed and controlled by Eleven Directors, who elect themselves their President and Vice-

who elect themselves their President and VicePresident.

Five Directors shall be a quorum. The Directors are elected by a strict majority of the votes
of the members present.

ART. XXVII.—The Directors may arrange
with one or more Incorporated Banks in Montreal by virtue of an Act of Parliament, for the
deposit therein of the funds and notes of the
Society, or in connection with any other financial matter.

Art. XXVIII.—The Directors in charge shall remain in office until they are replaced in a regular manner, unless they case to be Directors in fact, by reason of any of the following causes, to wit: Decense, resignation, insolvency, bank-ruptcy, conviction of crime or misdemeanor, or the possession of less than ten stated to attend the meetings of the Board of Directors during three consecutive months, or when he is owing three months of arrears, his office may be declared vacant by a resolution of the majority of the quorum of the other Directors.

The replacing of any Director whose office has became vacant by reason of one or any of the causes hereinbefore mentioned, is made by the Directors remaining in office at the time being, and the new Directors so elected shall be entitled to the same rights as the Directors elected at a general meeting.

Art. XXIX.—The President (or in his absence, the Vice-President), and the Secretary-Treasurer, on being authorized to that effect by a resolution of the floard of Directors, may contract for all loans deemed necessary or useful by the Directors, and on the conditions and restrictions approved by them. They may likewise, on the same authority and deliberation aforesaid, accept, acquire, possess, sell, alleante, transfer, bind and mortgage, for and on behalf of the Society, any landed estate, real and movemble properly of any mature whatsoever; in fact, all tiles, obligations for moneys, transfers, legacy, sams of money, debts, goods and real and movemble properly whatsoever, grants, stabrogations or other deeds carrying obligations for moneys, transfers, legacy, sams of moneys, debts, goods and real and investible properly whatsoever; the fact, all tiles obligations for moneys, transfers, legacy, sams of moneys and he signed by the President, by one of the Directors duly authorized to that effect, by the Board of Direc

ART. VIII.—At the expiration of such delay as the Directors may consider sufficient, the Society may such any shareholder in arrear, for the payment of his arrears, or for all such other may be liable for.

Whenever any shareholder shall be in arrears for twelve months with the payment of his weekly instalments, the Directors shall, upon resolution to the effect, confiscate his shares to the profit of the Society.

The reports of the Inspectors shall always be in writing, and they shall be sworn to if required by the Directors.

The fees of the Solicitor, Notary and Inspectors are fixed by the Directors.

ART. XXXIV.—All officers shall be required to have at least ten shares in the capital stock of the Society, and to give sufficient security for the due fulfilment of their duties whenever the Westers shall down 61.

ART, XXXV.—The annual general meeting of the members of the Society shall be held at its office, or at any other place in the city of Mont-real fixed upon by the Directors, on the third Monday of February, or the following juridical

Monday of February, or the following juridical day.
At this meeting the Directors are elected, and all other business of a general interest to the Society are transacted.
The Secretary-Trensurer submits a complete and correct statement of all the affairs of the Society for the year just now past up to the previous 31st of December.
This report is certifled by a majority of the Anditors.

ART. XXXVI.-The Directors may conveni ART. XXXVI.—The Directors may convene extraordinary general meetings, and such meetings shall be convened by the President, or three Directors, by public notice inserted three times a week, during two consecutive weeks before the day of said meetings, in two newspapers published in the City of Montreal.

All general meetings of the members of the Society, and also all meetings of Directors may be adjourned from day to day, or to any other day deemed convenient, for the purpose of deciding and completing the business submitted to their consideration.

Arr. XXXVII.—Upon a requisition in writing signed by fifteen members of the Society, and representing the reasons of said requisition, the President shall be bound to convene an extraordinary general meeting, stating in the notice of convocation, the requisition presented to him, and the purpose and object of such general meeting.

The meeting so convened shall take up no other matters than the special ones mentioned in the requisition for convening the said meeting. Should the President refuse or neglect to convene such meeting, the Shareholders who have signed the requisition, having previously deposited into the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer, a duplicate copy of their requisition duly signed and attested in presence of witnesses, may, themselves convene such meetings by notice to that effect over their signature, and published as aforesaid in the preceding article.

ART. XXXVIII.—At any general meeting, either for the election of Directors or for any other business, the members shall vote according to the number of Books they hold; and each Book entities its owner to one vote.

ART. XXXIX.—When the day appointed by

ART. XXXIX.—When the day appointed by the By-Laws for a meeting, a payment, or any other business of the Society shall happen to be a non-judicial day, such meeting, payment or business shall be postponed to the judicial day next ensuing.

ART. XI.—The Shareholders are bound to give notice of their change of residence.

Art. XLI.—When all the members shall have received their appropriations, the Society shall be dissolved, and all the obligations not yet owing of the members towards the Society, shall be extinguished.

But all arrears and fines due by members shall be collected, and the amount thereof distributed pro rata amongst those members only whose shares shall not be extinguished at the time of the dissolution.

ART. XLII.—The Directors make all such rules, and give such orders as may be necessary for the execution of the foregoing by-laws. ART. XLIII.—For the practical observance of the said by-laws and of all amendments thereto that may be passed subsequently, the decision and interpretation of the Directors shall be final; but any member may appeal from such decision at a general meeting.

The said appeal shall be made within a delay of thirty days.

ART. XLIV.—The said by-laws shall come into force on and from the day of the adoption thereof.

WEEKLY REFIEW.

Wholesale business has been very quiet this week, and there are no new features to notice in any department. The harbour is now almost clear of shipping and the last vessel for, Ontario left the wharf on Wednesday night, so that trade may be considered to have entered into the winter duliness. The "Sardinlan," the last vessel to leave for Liverpool, took out 31,000 boxes of cheese and 3,632 packages of butter, an anusually large shipment. Retail trade is duli both in the city and throughout the provinces, owing to the continued mild weather.

LEATHEL—Business has assumed a quieter tone, and transactions for the week have been less in amount. Most of the manufacturers are preparing for stock-taking, and are only buying what is absolutely necessary. Prices are unchanged.

BOOTS AND SHOES.—A little business is

doing in a sorting-up way, but orders are small, and the fall demand seems pretty much over. Winter weather would probably stimulate the trade in warm winter goods, for which there has as yet been little demand. Prices remain

PIG IRON.—We have no change to report since last week, and we cannot expect much till after the turn of the year. All the present small stocks are used up.

InQUORS.—There has been but little change during the past week. As navigation still remains open, jobbers continue to be busy. We notice that the stock of imported ale and stout are being quickly reduced, and we expect to see these goods very scarce early in the year.

DRY GOODS.—Trade is exceedingly dull at present, owing in a large measure to the continued mild weather. Of course, at this season of the year, no activity is expected, and a fair sorting trade continues; all the business that has been done for the past ten days. Few orders of any size have been received, and until the cold weather sets in the present depression will continue. There are some travellers still in the west, but they are meeting with poor success, and barely paying expenses. Remittances come in rather slowly.

GROCERIES.—The market has been very quiet this week, there being no movement between lobbers, and only a quiet distribution to retailers.

TEA is meeting with a small demand from re-tailers, and occasionally an old parcel is sold to jobbers at low prices, but the market as a whole is dull and without prospect of immediate im-provement, either in the demand or price. The best enquiry is for Japan at from 25c to 27c. COFFEE is without any new feature, the de-mand being confined to Java and Mocha, of which about 50 bags have been sold at low fig-ures.

SUGAR—The market has sustained a further decline this week, and prices are now extremely low. New York has been dull, with prices running extremely in favor of purchasers, and there has been some speculation in consequence on the part of jobbers in American yellow and granulated. We quote dry crushed at \$\frac{9}{2}\$ to 10c; granulated, \$\frac{9}{2}\$ to \$\frac{1}{2}\$ to, and American yellow at \$\frac{6}{2}\$ to 7.2c. The low price of American sugar has materially affected the sale of Scotch refined, which is difficult to sell at from 7c to \$\frac{1}{2}\$ the prices asked. The stock of Scotch is not large, but it has to be sold at a heavy loss. The objection to accumulating a large stock of American yellow at the present low figures is the dampness of the sugar, which becomes like paste in cold weather, and is undestrabla for the retail trade. Haw is nominal in the absence of either demand or supply. FRUIT—The stock of Malaga fruit is moving off very slowly, owing to the low price of Valencias, which gives them the preference. Prices are unchanged for all kinds. New crop Sultans are in short supply. Currants are very dull and difficult to move, even at present low prices. Figs in small boxes are enquired for, but there are none here. Frunes are scarce; advices from abroad report considerable decline in the primary market. Nuts, a light stock, and firmly held, buyers awaiting the arrival of new stock. SPICES are held more firmly all round, but this has checked the demand, and the movement has been unimportant.

SALT—The business of the season is about over, the wharves have been cleared, and the stock is now all stored and firmly held.

SYRUP quiet and unchanged.

MOLASSES—There is a fairly good demand for small lots, and some 150 thick, have been sold this week, principally sugar-house at 25c to

sold this week, principally sugar-house at 25c to

27c in barrels, and Muscovado at 81c; Barbadoes is selling at 38c, and Porto Rico at 30c to 35c, according to quality.

FISH—Labrador herrings are now moving off slowly, and, as there is an ample supply, the price has this week fullen 25c per barrel—to \$4.50 to 4.75. Salmon dull and unchanged. Green cod is scarce, and has advanced \$1 per barrel—from \$4 to 4.50 for No 1 and from \$3 to 3.50 for No. 2.

Owing to the heavy rains and muddy roads our city retail markets were not largely attended by market gardeners and farmers, and prices are somewhat higher.

Turkeys are in large demand at from 75c to \$1.00 per pair; Geese are solling from 60c to \$1 per pair; chickens, 30c to 35c do; ducks 20c per pair; wild ducks are very plentiful 50c to 60c per do; pigeons are very scarce and dear, are solling at \$1.25 do; quaits are in large supply at 25c per dozen; prairie hens are solling at \$1 per pair; partridges are very plentiful at 70c per pair; hares, 30c.

FRUIT.—The market still remains glutted with apples, and the prices asked are still very low. American apples are solling at \$1.50 per barrel; Canadian Apples, \$2.00 to 2.50 per barrel; Montreal Fameuse are cheaper, and are now selling at from \$2.50 to 3.00. Malaga grapes are plentiful, at \$8.50 per barrel of 50 pounds. Granberries, \$8.00 per barrel. Lemons, \$6.00 per box, or \$11.00 per case. Oranges, \$7.00 per case.

VEGETABLES.—Potatoes were plentiful being

VEGETABLES.—Potatoes were plentiful, being largely brought to the city on the market boats. The general price of pretty good potatoes is 30c per bag, very fine ones being \$1 per bag, while inferior kinds sell at from 75c to \$5c. The supply of other roots is fair, but prices are slightly higher since the gardeners have secured their late crops. Beets are 35c to 40c per bushel. Carrots and Swedish Turnips 30c to 35c per bushel. Parsnips 50c per bushel. Yellow Turnips 40c per bug; Quebec Turnips \$1 per barrel. The price of onions has advanced considerably of late, owing to considerable quantities being shipped to Britain; the price of good onions is \$5 per barrel. The supply of cabbage is large but the quality is generally inferior; prices to day are from 10c to 25c per dozen heads. Celery 25c to 25c per dozen heads. Sweet potatoes \$5 per barrel.

Dressed Hogs, Beef and Mutron.—The supply of dressed hogs was not large, but there is very little demand for it; prices are from \$4.25 to \$4.75 per 100 lbs, a few rather inferior looking quarters of beef were offered at \$3 per 100 lbs, for the fore-quarters, and \$4.50 for the hind-quarters. Mutton quarters are not plentiful and sell at about 5c per pound for fore-quarters, and 6c per pound for hind-quarters.

Business Troubles.

A writ of saisie consercutoire was issued by H. & A. Saunders, through the office of Messrs, Keller & McCorkell, in the matter of Savage, Lyman & Co. The bailiffs, under the authority of the above writ, entered the insolvents' premises, St. James street, and took possession. The writ is taken upon the ground that the assignces and inspectors have re-fused to obey the writ of appeal, and in spite thereof continued to dispose of the stock.

LOCAL NEWS.

THE ST. BRIEGET'S BAZAAR,-This bazaar commences on the 16th of December, next door west from Donegana's Hotel, Notre Dame street. Judge Berthelot has kindly allowed the use of the shop for the good work. Rev. Father Lonergan, No. 30 Seaton street, will gratefully receive any offering for the Bazaar. We are sure every Catholic in Montreal, especially the Irish, will take a part in the charitable design. Remember, this will be the first Catholic Church. purely Irish in origin and built under Irish auspices, ever erected in this city. From a handful, our Celtic countrymen have grown to be a power in Montreal. They have never been called upon to bear one-tenth the burdens of other communities, and surely they should take a special pride in the contem-plated church, and manifest that pride by a generous assistance, which will prove them no degenerate sons of the church-building Irish race.

ROMAN CATHOLIC .- During the week ending Saturday last 69 interments were made in the Cote des Neiges cemetery of persons dying outside the city limits. Of this number 38 were boys, 5 married men, and 1 widower; 20 girls, 7 married women, 3 widows, and 3 spinsters. Nationality—English-speaking Canadians, 15; Irish, 2; French, 1; French-speaking Canadians, 51. Cause of death—Small-pox, 19; diphtheria, 4; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1. Thirty interments were made in the same cemetery of persons dying in the outlying municipalities during the same period. Of contagious diseases 2 deaths resulted from typhoid fever, 3 from small-pox (all in St. Cunegonde), 2 from diphtheria, and one from putrid fever at Cote St. Paul.

PROTESTANT .- During the week ending Saturday last 12 interments were made of persons dying inside the city limits; of this number 2 were boys; 3 bachelors; 1 married man; 3 girls; 1 married woman; 1 widower; 1 spinster; Scotch 1; Irish 2; English 1; of contagious diseases, one died of small-pox; 2 of typhoid fever and 1 of scarlet fever. Outside the limits there were four deaths; no contagious diseases.
