FEED GRAIN STORAGE, MARITIME PROVINCES

Question No. 444—**Mr. Fairweather:**

1. During 1965, how much feed grain was stored in the port of Halifax to be used by famers of the maritime provinces during the winter of 1965-1966?

2. Is it considered that there is an adequate reserve of feed grain now available in Halifax for distribution to farmers in the martimes?

Hon. Maurice Sauvé (Minister of Forestry):

1. 2,150,000 bushels.

2. These supplies are considered to be short of meeting the full needs of the martimes for this winter. However, rail rates are now available for direct hauling from the lakehead to maritime destinations, which are competitive with the normal water haul.
