TOLLS ON RIDEAU-TRENT-SEVERN WATERWAY—POSSIBLE CONSULTATION WITH CORTS COMMITTEE BEFORE IMPOSITION

Mr. P. B. Rynard (Simcoe North): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. The minister stated in reply to a question asked by the hon. member for Frontenac-Lennox and Addington concerning the authorization of the first ever tolls on the Rideau-Trent-Severn waterway that he accepted full responsibility. In view of the fact that the CORTS Committee of the Rideau-Trent-Severn waterway made a very strong point of the fact that this is a unique waterway, the only one without usage fees, I would like to ask the minister whether he consulted this committee before taking this action.

Hon. Judd Buchanan (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, the committee was not consulted before taking this action because when the matter was discussed and approved by the Treasury Board, the CORTS Committee was not in existence. This is just a relatively recent development. I think it is three weeks since the committee was formed, so in fact this matter was a fait accompli before the CORTS agreement was signed and before the committee came into existence. I should mention that these fees only represent seven per cent of the operating costs of the canal system. This question was asked by an hon. member the other day.

Mr. Rynard: I would like to ask the minister if it was not on the suggestion of the federal government that the CORTS Committee was set up just for this advice. I think it has been set up longer than the minister suggests.

Mr. Buchanan: Mr. Speaker, the submission and approval of the fee structure antedates the establishment of the CORTS Committee, and the mandate of the CORTS Committee is far broader than simply this narrow aspect as far as its interest in dealing with the operation of the canals involved.

Mr. Munro (Hamilton East): This is a 40 cent increase, and will put it ahead of that of any other jurisdiction.

POSSIBILITY OF NEW BUDGET IN VIEW OF HIGH UNEMPLOYMENT—SUGGESTED INCREASE IN PROCESSING RAW MATERIALS TO CREATE EMPLOYMENT

Mr. Nystrom: A supplementary question. Is the Prime Minister now ready to instruct the Minister of Finance to bring in a new budget in view of the fact that the unemployment rate will be nearly 9 per cent by the end of this year?
