APROCLAMATION.



HEREAS His Majesty has been graciously pleased to order a Number of Troops, under the Command of the Honourable Lieutenant-General St. Clair, to proceed from Great-Britain to Louisbourg, with a sufficient Convoy of Men of War, and with them a great Part of His Majesty's Troops now in Garrison at Louisbourg, and also with such Troops as shall be levied for that Purpose in His Majesty's Colonies in North-America, to attempt the immediate Reduction of Canada; and has signified His Royal Pleasure to Me, as also to the Governours of the several Provinces and Colonies of Virginia, Maryland, Vensilvania, New-Jersey-, New-Tork, Connessicut, Rhode-Island and the Massachusetts-Bay, by Letters dispatch'd from his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, That the necessary Dispositions should be forthwith made for the raising as many Men within this and the above-mentioned Governments as the showness of the Time will admit, for proceeding on the said Expedition:

AND whereas the Members of the General Assembly of this Province, on a Special Convention for this Service, have, with the utmost Chearfulness and Unanimity, voted to give all necessary and proper Encouragement for One Thousand Voluntiers that shall enlist into His Majesty's Service in this Expedition:

I have thought fit, with the Advice of his Majesty's Council, to issue this Proclamation, in order to make known his Pajesty's gracious Intentions and Declarations for the Encouragement of all able-bodied effective Pen that are inclined to inlift themselves into his Service in the said Expedition, together with the surther Encouragement which is offered by this Sovernment, viz. That the said Columtiers will be under such Officers as I shall appoint; That they will be immediately entitled to his Pajesty's Pay, the Officers from the Time they shall engage in his Pajesty's Service, and the Soldiers from the respective Days on which they shall be enlisted; That if Provision cannot be made of Arms and Cloathing sor them, by reason of the Shortness of the Time, a reasonable Allowance will be made them in Poncy sor the same; That they shall be entitled to a Share of the Booty that shall be taken from the Enemy, and shall be sent back to their several Paditations, when this Service shall be over, unless any of them shall desire to settle else-

Where.

AND for the further Encouragement of all Voluntiers that shall engage in this Service, It is provided, That they shall receive Thirty Pounds in Bills of Crodit es the old Tenoz, as a Bounty; as also for each Pan a good Blanket, and a Bed for every two Pen; the said Bounty to be paid upon their Enlishment, and the Blankets, or Poney in Lieu of the Blankets, and Beds at the Time of their Embarkation, or proceeding on the said Expedition: And that all such Poluntiers as shall proceed on this Expedition, shall be exempted from all Impresses for two Pears after their Return.

Given at the Council-Chamber in PORTSMOUTH, the Fifth Day of June, 1746. In the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord GEORGE the Second by the Grace of GOD of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, KING, Defender of the Faith, &c.
