flesh-colour: head and body white as snow: back, wings, and base of the tail, pale grey: the rest of its length white: shape somewhat pointed: quills whitish, down the shafts inclining to brown; the outer one the longest: all the secondaries nearly of equal length: legs dusky slesh-colour; naked far above the knees: claws dusky.

PLACE.

This Pallas mentions as a nondescript; and was met with by him on the coast of Holland, cast ashore between the villages of Catwick and Scheveningen, in the winter 1760.

MARBLED G.

DESCRIPTION.

Marbled Guillemot, Ard. Zool. No 438. pl. 22. Lev. Mus.

THIS is larger than the little Auk: and is ten inches in length. The bill compressed a little on the sides, rather stender, and one inch in length: crown of the head dusky: upper part of the body transversely barred with tawny, chesnut, and blackish brown, as far as the tail, which is short and black: the wing coverts dusky, some of the larger edged with white: quills black: the chin and throat are dusky, mixed with irregular blotches of white: sides of the neck plain dusky: breast, belly, and vent, irregularly barred and undulated with dusky and white, changing to the last at the vent: legs and toes of a pale orange: webs and claws black.

Male and female much alike.

PLACE.

The above inhabits Prince William's Sound, on the western coast of America; from whence the pair in the Leverian Museum was brought. One in the possession of Sir Joseph Banks was found at Kamtschatka.
