OTTAWA, June 26.-(Special.)-While the actual immigration for April, the official figures of which are only just to hand, shows that the influx of people into Canada is 44,051, as compared with 33,313 in April last year, the immigration from the United States shows a falling off of 2743,

immigration was 168,718, as against 124,031 for the same period of last year, an increase of 44,687.

The most significant figures in the possession of the government are those which show the number of new comers who have become naturalized citizens of this country. For the whole calendar year, 1905, the number of newcomers who took the oath of allegiance was 6632. Last year, 1906, the official figures of which have just been compiled, the total number of new citizens was 10,242. These included Chinese, Japanese, Russians, Germans, Hungarians, Galicians and many others. The figures show that practically the head of every family which entered Canada in 1903 took steps to become a citizen and a voter. No fewer than 3888 of the new arrivals from the United States took the oath of allegiance just so soon as the law allowed. This figure was an increase of 600 over the previous year, and all indications are that the same proportion will be preserved this year.
