

So much attention has been paid of late to accident often happens after eucaine has so much attention has been paid of late to the charges recently given voice in London that American thorobreds are often drugged for the purpose of affecting their natural speed, increasing or decreasing it, as the trainer may desire, and also by Lord Durham's strictures on American turf methods, that the impression has been given to those who are not well informed in such matters that this method of obtaining an unfair advantage in horseracing found its origin in this country, and heretofore has been a feature peculiar to the turf in the United States.

It is almost impossible to use bandages upon the hind legs, for which reason a spray of ether, occaine and eucaine is used.
