Rates May Be Increased-Meeting of the Hospital Trust.

The hospital trust met in Col. Lewis' office yesterday afternoon, with Col. Lewis, Mr. C. F. Complin, Mayor Wilson and the superintendent, Dr. J. D. Balfour, present. Applications to become members of the nursing staff were received from Miss Janet Hotson, city, and Miss Minnie E. Lombe, Arkona. The applicants were accepted on probation. Miss McNab, who has been a probationer for the past few months, admitted to the staff. Dr. Baifour, who was asked at the

last meeting to prepare a statement of the average cost of paying patients, reported that an accurate estimate could not be given, owing to the fact that separate accounts of the maintenance of the different classes of patients were not kept. The average cost of all patients, paying and non-paying, for 1897, was 80 cents. The total cost of maintenance was \$16,589 04, and the total number of days patients stayed in the hospital was 20,634. There were 163 paying patients (80 from the city, 40 from the county, and 43 outsiders); and these were kept 3,131 days, or an average of 20 days each. From them was received \$3,000, the day rate being 90 cents. Thus it may be found that the average cost of the non-paying patients was 77 cents a day. The proportion of patients who entered for medical treatment to those who came for surgical treatment was 1 to 2.
