GREETINGS TO CONGRESS

Laymen May Administer Private Baptism in Cases of Emergency.

TORONTO, Sept. 19 .- Practically the TORONTO, Sept. 19.—Practically the whole of the sessions of the Anglican General Synod today were taken up with the revision of the prayer book. Among the more important of subjects dealt with were the holy communion and public and private baptism of infants. A number of minor changes were also ecected in the catechism and the order for the visitation of the sick. Collects, epistles and gospels contained in the liturgy of the Scottish Church, in the marriage and burial services were inserted at the end of the services of the Book of Common Prayer. With the exception of one prayer the form of service for use of days of national thanks-giving was adopted.

The appointment of a war service commission to deal with all matters affecting returned soldiers was made and a resolution of greeting sent to the Trades and Labor Congress now in session in Quebec.

Committee On Labor.

The Lower House early today adopted a motion to the effect that a committee be formed to look after the question of co-operation with labor for betterment of conditions between employers.

The following will form the committee: Principal W. H. Vance, Vancouver; Canon Plumptre, Toronto; Chief Justice Mathers, Winnipeg; Lansing Lewis, Montreal.

A call for the co-operation of all laymen in the work to be undertaken for the welfare of returned soldiers was made by Dean Starr, Kingston. Such a society as the Brotherhood of St. Andrew could play a valuable and inspiring part in the social service end of church life. He recommended greater use of parish halls as social centres for returned men.

#### BOARD OF TRADE ORDERS SEPTEMBER CORN DEALS OFF

Chicago Sellers Instructed to Refund Purchase Price to Buyers.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19 .- All trading in corn for delivery in store, or by grade alone, in Chicago in September was ordered stopped today by the directors of the board of trade. At the same time all transactions in indemnities executed on September 18 in September corn were declared null and void, and the sellers were ordered to refund to the buyers the purchase price of the indemnities.

The reason given was the embargo placed yesterday, which restricted to a great extent shipments of grain to the Chicago market, and the fact that practically all of the storage space suitable for receiving grain on September contracts is now filled with grain largely held for the Government.

PRESIDENT OF REICHSTAG HOPES FOR ARMISTICE.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 19.—Konstantin Fehrenbach, president of the German Reichstag, declared in a recent interview that it was not impossible to hope for an armistice before winter, "despite the enemy's bellicose shouting." The interview was printed in the Rhenische Westphalian Gazette of Essen.
