Hay dropped on the local market since Friday. It was selling at \$22 to \$25 per ton yesterday morning, but 20 loads were brought in during the day, and the sales became slow. By night the price had dropped to \$20 per ton, the low quotation, and \$24 per ton, the high quotation.

Dairy butter was selling at 45 cents to 47 cents wholesale and 50 cents retail. It is expected that this product will be scarce soon, as the farmers do not bring in so much during the summer months, sending their milk to the cheese factories instead.

NEW YORK COTTON EXCHANGE.

New York, June 7.—The stock market gave another good demonstration of its strength today. Evening-up was a factor, but the list was quite responsive also to the favorable summary of business conditions reported by the mercantile agencies. In addition, confidence that the peace treaty would soon be out of the way, and a current of optimism in the earnings of railroads, testifying to the activities in commercial lines, influenced spirited bidding for many stocks. The closing was strong.
