BLISS CARMAN, ONE OF GREATEST POETS, GUEST OF LONDONER

**After Long Fight For Life,
Comes To Visit His
Friends.**

Bliss Carman, among the greatest of America's poets, and without doubt Canada's greatest poet, was a visitor in London last night. He arrived in London last night at 9:55, via the C. P. R., where he was met by Peter McArthur, Ekfrid's famous author, who came to this city for the purpose, and H. A. McCallum of this city, who acted as host to the two celebrities overnight.

Fresh from the wilderness surrounding Lake Placid, New York, where beneath open skies he fought a courageous battle with a malignant disease and won, Bliss Carman has come to visit Peter McArthur at his farm near Appin, Ont. It is his first visit to this part of Canada.

Tall, well set up, Bliss Carman looked vigorous and the picture of health as he stepped from the train. Despite the long and wearisome trip from Montreal he showed but few signs of fatigue and certainly not the invalid one would expect to find after such a long siege of illness. Mr. McArthur asserted that he never saw Mr. Carman look better.

Indefinitely.

Despite vigorous protests from Peter McArthur, who urged that the visit should last indefinitely, as numerous people were waiting to grasp his hand, the poet staunchly argued that he had come to visit Peter McArthur, and "After my long stay in the solitude, crowds drive me into panics," he added.

Although no one could be more affable than the poet, for he, according to Mr. McArthur, is as big-hearted as he is in stature, Mr. Carman did not relish being interviewed. Laughingly he waved his hand toward the philosopher who made Ekfrid famous, and said: "He will take the interview."

"Humph," ejaculated Dr. McCallum, "Peter McArthur knows Bliss Carman better than he knows himself."

He was born in 1874, a year which was particularly kind to Canada for no less than four great Canadian poets, Campbell, Lampan and Duncan Campbell Scott were born in that year. The historical Grand Pre, made famous by Longfellow's Evangeline, was his birthplace. The salt-scented air of his boyhood's playground instilled within him soul the love for the sea and so the world was made more beautiful by such poems as "The Ships of Grey St. Johns" and "The Ballads of Lost Haven."

Nature Poets

But great as his sea poems were, he reached a still greater pinnacle of beauty in his poems of nature. His "Spring Song" is perhaps his best. He is without doubt, the greatest creator of lyrics in America today. Critics in all parts of the world are almost unanimous in the belief that Carman will become America's greatest poet.

Thirty years ago he left Nova Scotia and sought his fortunes in New York. In this city he spent his twentieth year along with Peter McArthur. One two became fast friends. During the 30 years spent in New York he was the editor of various publications.

When he was stricken with illness and was forced to fight for his life in numerous sanatoriums, the sympathy of the world went out to him. Many times this sympathy was shown in a more substantial way than mere words, for assistance came to him from the world over.

Bliss Carman, accompanied by Mr. McArthur, will leave for Appin at noon today.

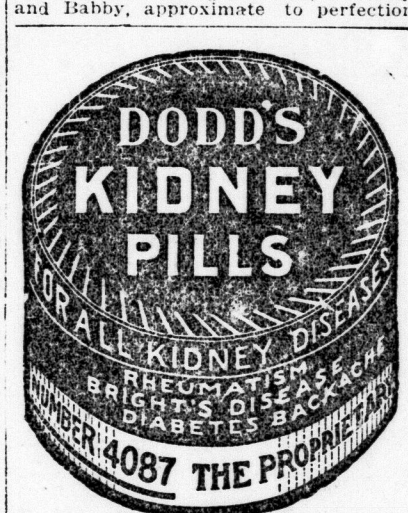

The clown band led by Lew Gould is a clever aggregation, including Loy Henderson, Joe Quinn, Harry LaRue, Carl Kubler and Max M. Simon. Eileen Christie as Zingarella is an actress of merit. Misses Callahan and Lorraine, as Bobby and Abby, approximate to perfection.



In the juvenile roles, Bessie Franklin very adequately takes the part of Villains. Eva Magnus as Cicely also creditably takes a principal part. Charles Silver as Tripp, Joseph Robinson and Uncle George and Charles George as Paul give satisfactory support.

Cocoa Float

2 cups milk
2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons Cowan's Cocoa
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Method:—Scald milk, mix cornstarch, cocoa, salt and cinnamon. Add scalded milk slowly. Cook in a double boiler 20 minutes or until thick and there is no taste of raw starch, stirring constantly. Add egg yolks beaten slightly, and cook till egg thickens; flavor; cool. Beat egg whites until stiff and firm, add 4 table-spoons of icing sugar gradually, heating all the time; flavor. Turn cocoa mixture into a glass, and drop by table-spoons the egg white mixture on top.



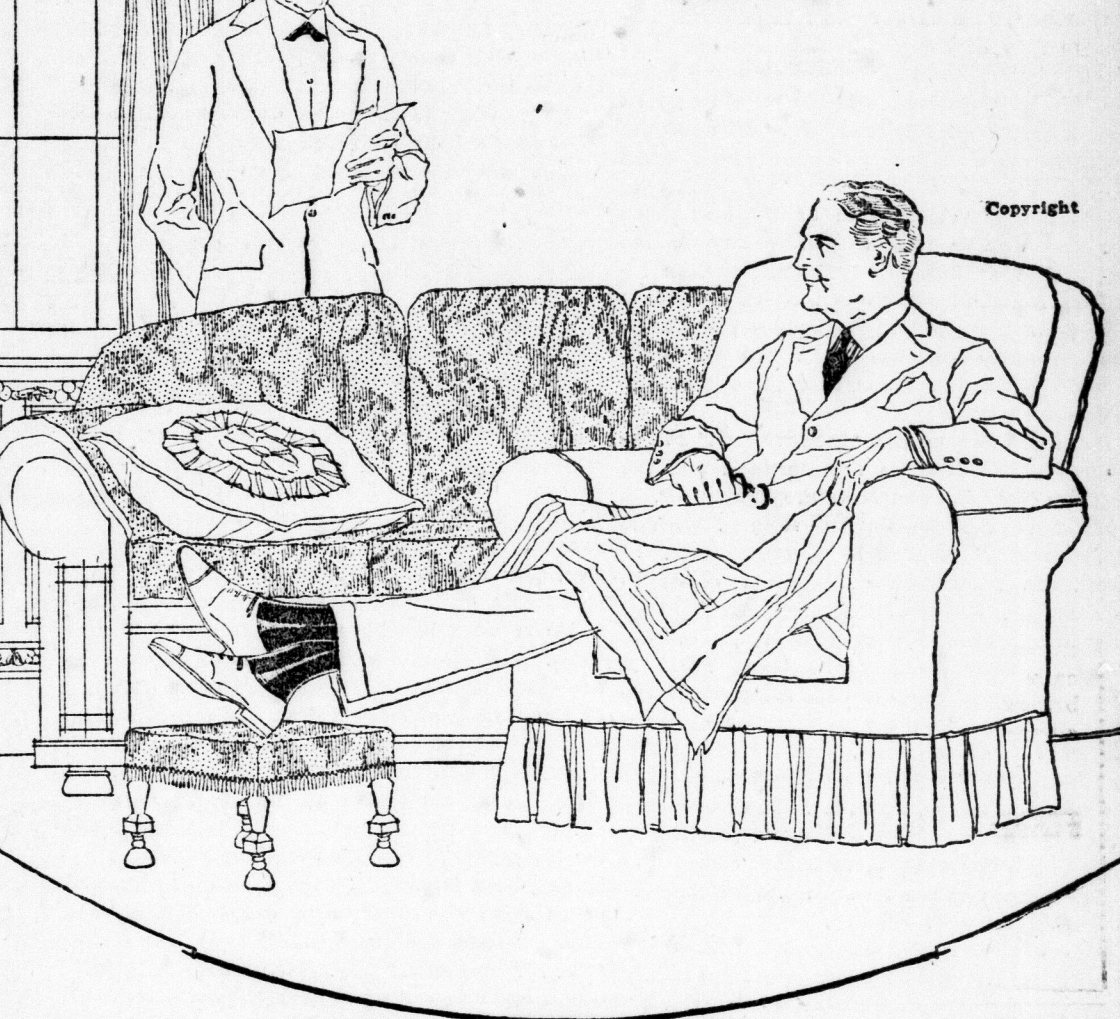

**London Will Be Strong Rival
For Premier Honors of
Road.****DANCE FLOOR PLANNED
Company To Pay \$2,000 of
Expenses of Building
Grandstand.**

By the wonderful spirit shown by the 400 or so persons who attended the G. T. R. Athletic Association's banquet held in the library room of the carshops Friday night, it was quite evident that the famous Grand Trunk Athletic Association in Montreal is to have a strong rival for the athletic laurels of that company. An outline for an extensive program of activities was outlined by Master Car Builder L. N. Clark of the local shops as he answered to the toast to "The G. T. R."

Mr. Clark outlined the growth of sports among the men of the shops and how it had been given impetus by the track teams, the baseball and football teams, during the past season. He then spoke on the plans which are to be undertaken to complete the athletic grounds, the construction of which had been held up early in the season.

Athletic Grounds.

A campaign is to be staged among the men and by other means to raise the sum of \$3,000. In addition to this the company had promised the sum of \$2,000. The whole amount is to be used exclusively in erecting the athletic grounds and grandstand which are to be located south of the George White & Sons foundry. The work on the grounds he said would be started early in the spring, so that preparation for sports could be started early in the year.

In preparation for this the partition dividing the library building was to be arranged in two parts so that it could be folded back. The one room of the building, which has at present a concrete floor, is to be refloored with hard wood. This will give a dancing floor to accommodate one hundred couples.

M. C. B. George Fisher of the Ontario lines, told the men that the G. T. R. stood behind any move better sports. He assured the association that the officials of the Ontario lines would do all in their power to assist in making the program in London a success.

Successful Year.

M. Morrow, the toastmaster, speaking in reply to the toast to the "Amateur Athletic Association," told of the aims and objects of the organization. He felt fully confident that a more successful year than ever—if that were possible—lay before the association.

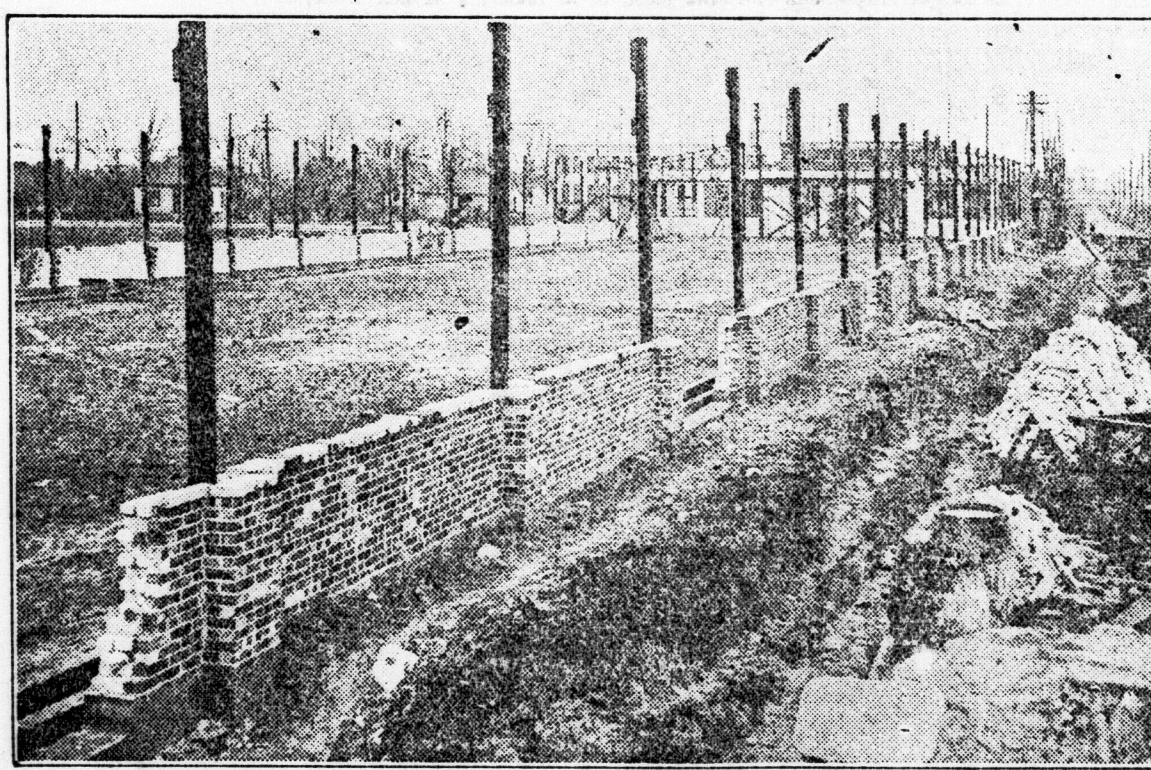

The other speakers of the evening were Dr. P. A. Stevenson, replying to "Our Local House," and D. Menzies to the "Employees."

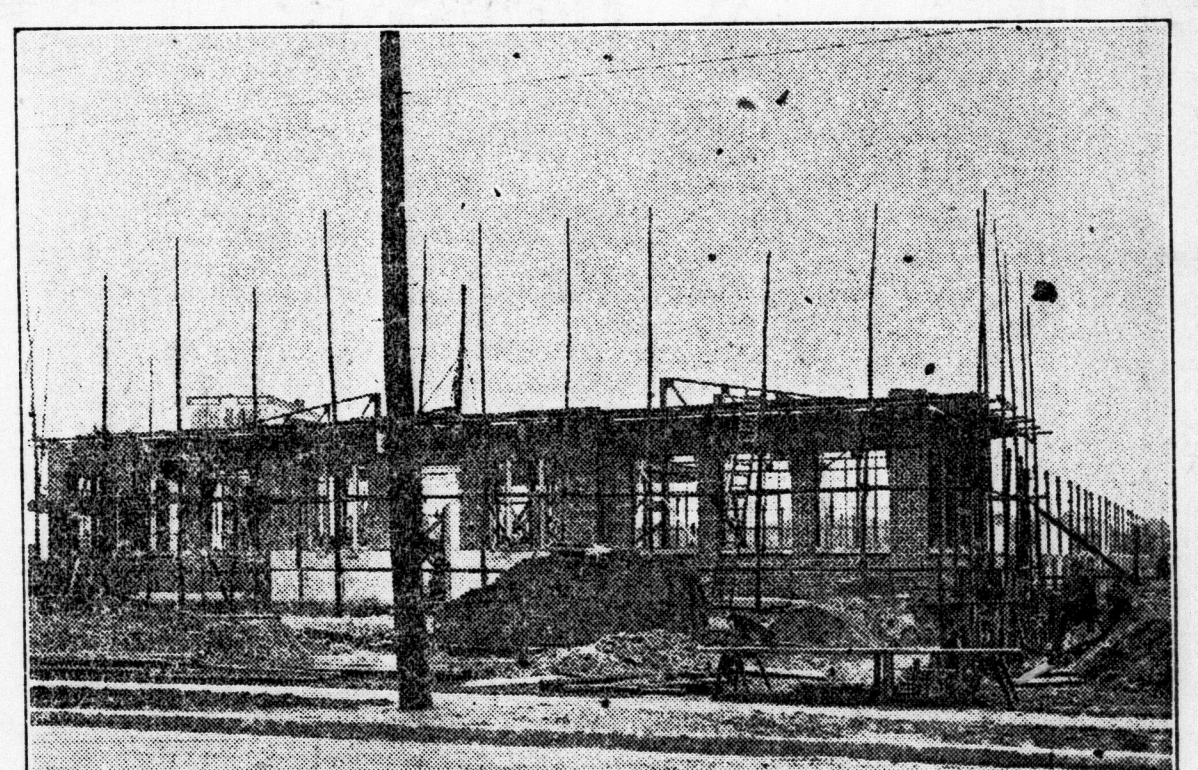

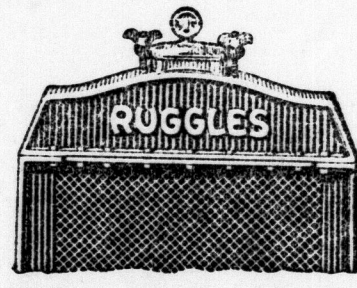
