

TRAM ACCIDENT NEAR MONTREAL CAUSES INJURIES TO FIFTEEN

STREET RAILWAY ACCIDENTS OCCUR EVERY DAY ACCORDING TO STATISTICS

Total of 372 for Year 1919—Collisions With Automobiles Total 193—Alighting From Car Three Times As Dangerous As Boarding One.

An accident occurs on the London street railway every day in the year, according to the fourteenth annual report of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, which has just been issued. The exact number during 1919 was 372. Many of these were of a very minor character. There were 24 persons injured and 22 others a total of 46.

December, apparently, is the month in which accidents are most prone to happen. There were 49 during that month in 1919, February on the other hand, perhaps because it has only 28 days, is the period during which there are few accidents. Only ten occurred in that month last year.

Collisions with automobiles were the most common mishaps, there being 193 of these. Forty-seven collisions with wagons, and 19 collisions with other cars occurred. The statistics further show that alighting from a car is just as dangerous as boarding one. Fifteen people were injured in the latter act, and 45 in the former.

Two cars were derailed, while there were nine collisions with motorcycles and bicycles, and 49 miscellaneous accidents, perhaps because it has only 28 days.

PEACE BEFORE CHRISTMAS FEDERAL ISLE Every Effort Is Being Put Forth by All Factions.

BISHOP'S HOME RAIDED Cardinal Logue Declares the Catholics Will Aid in Ending Reign of Terror.

Dublin, Dec. 6.—Determined efforts to bring about an early peace in Ireland are being made here. Conversations have been in progress more than a week, and hope was expressed last night by some of those engaged in the negotiations that within another week a tangible basis of settlement might be reached.

The chief intermediary at work is the Rev. Patrick Joseph Clune, Bishop of Perth, Australia, who, it is understood, has been asked by Premier Lloyd George to sound out the Sinn Féin sentiment, and prepare, if possible, the ground for which a foundation for the peace edifice can be erected.

He is a native of County Clare, and went to Australia 34 years ago. He arrived in Ireland last August, and after visiting for several weeks in the other districts in County Clare, he made a number of trips back and forth to England. He stated to the Associated Press yesterday that negotiations still were progressing, but that "too soon to say" he could not make any definite predictions relative to their success. He declared, however, he had great hopes that the peace negotiations would be successful.

To Interview Greenwood. Mr. Clune planned to have a final interview today with Sir Henry Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, who made a special week-end trip to this island in connection with the peace movement. The Australian prelate expects to go to London tonight or tomorrow to report on the result of his work to Premier Lloyd George. Every facility to carry out his mission had been given him by the government, he said, and he was free from espionage that he had talked not only with Arthur Griffith and other Sinn Féin leaders, but also with the active members of the peace movement on whom the government is trying its utmost to lay its hands.

Confere With Lloyd. "It is too early as yet to make public what has thus far been accomplished," he said, when asked to determine if there is peace made, and not in Ireland. My work has been merely to try to arrange the preliminaries, and I will know, perhaps in a week, whether it has been successful.

So far as can be ascertained, members of the British labor commission visiting Ireland are not directly concerned in the peace movement, which Mr. Clune is engineering. Arthur Henderson had a talk with the British labor commission yesterday, and is returning to England.

In order to open these markets to their goods, the manufacturers have asked the Government to guarantee their advances to 100 per cent. When we left England the Government had offered to guarantee 80 per cent of the value of the goods sold to these countries. How the matter was finally settled I do not know.

GREEKS VOTE IN FAVOR OF RETURN OF CONSTANTINE

Half a Million Majority Is Reported As Result of Plebiscite.

BRITAIN'S WARNING Will Extend No Further Financial Aid If Ex-King Regains Throne.

ATHENS, Dec. 6.—Great Britain will extend no further financial aid to Greece in case former King Constantine returns to the throne, according to a note presented to the Greek government yesterday by Earl Granville, British minister in this city.

The French minister also presented a note to the government demanding the payment of outstanding loans. The note stated that the French government was prepared to advance a loan of 600,000 drachmas, which was arranged during the regime of former Premier Venizelos.

"We can only do what the people want," said Premier Rallis in speaking of the two communications. "The Greek people have decided to return to the throne of Constantine. I will reply in a few days to the British and French notes."
