## WE SCORED ONE-RUN VICTORY ON SUNDAY

Bunny Hearne Was the Stead-  
ier and Secured Victory  
Over Bill McTigue.

Providence, April 29.—Larry Lajoie, playing before about 2000 fans today at Rocky Point, had the satisfaction of winning his first International League game on this day, his Toronto team handing a 3-2 victory to the Grays in the opening game of the series. The big Frenchman was given a fine reception, and while he did nothing of note with the bat, he showed by his smooth fielding on the few chances he had one of the reasons for his standing in the affections of the fans.

The battle for honors developed in a great duel between southpaws in which the former Leaf won wearing Providence. Lajoie was picked for the same number of hits as Hearne, but he didn't have the control, and all of the time that suited over the plate were more or less the product of his wildness. Bases on balls started two of the runs and a high fast one sandwiched in, that for the first six innings played great, but the only one of the Grays to connect.

With the exception of two hits early in the game, all of the local stickwork came in the last three seasons, when all singles were torn off, three coming in a row in the seventh. Hearne apparently weakened at this stage, and but for some nifty outfielding on the part of Whitman and Jacobson, Bunny might have been shunted to the warm confines of the special car, and one of the twirlers Larruping Larry had constantly warning up any emergency sent to these fielding stunts, it might be said in passing that Whitman played long away from May's bat, three times with men on the bases, while Jacobson killed apparently certain home runs by dashing up the hill in left-center and pulling down whistling drives from the clubs of O'Leary and Tutwiler when the corners were peopled.

The Leafs opened the run-getting in the second, when a walk to Graham started the trouble. Lajoie, who had taken a fine bunt that Thomas made an equally fine play on, Graham taking second. Thomas fumbled Allen's badly-bouncing grounder, giving the hitter a life. Kelly walked on a single into left, then sent Graham across the plate. Powell shot the ball home, and O'Leary chased it, setting it back in time to nail Allen, who streaked it from first on a walk to second, and scored in a moment later when McTigue cut loose a wild pitch.

One run drifted back in the fourth, when, with one gone, Powell walked, took first on Kelly's two-bagger and left-center. O'Leary's long fly to left-center, that Whitman grabbed. The winning run was lassoed in the fifth, when O'Leary drew a base on balls and was sacrificed to second by Kelly, and after Hearne had canned Jacobson hit safely to centre, Allen scoring, as Powell threw high over May's head.

The Grays nearly upset the dope in their half of the innings. With one out, Tutwiler, Thomas and Cooney scored, while the latter drove sending Tutwiler home. Allen threw home to get Tut, and the ball rolled a little way to the left. Thomas rounded third and set sail for the plate, but Kelly pounced on the ball, and O'Leary covering the plate, Thomas. The weather was frightfully cold. The teams play a double-header to-morrow, the Wednesday game being brought forward.
