

The board of works reconsidered their decision to consider all lawn fences as obstructions and yesterday voted to leave at the discretion of the works commissioner the demolition of the more dangerous ones.

Among the citizens who appeared to protest against the order for removal of all fences was J. D. Allan, Wellesley and Homewood avenue, who said that his fence cost \$9 a foot. It was an ornament, and not an obstruction, he maintained. He complained that when notice was served on him he was treated like a criminal by officials of the works department.
