JUNIOR MEDS WIN THE JENNINGS CUP

Defeating Victoria by Two Goals in Inter-Faculty Final at Varsity.

Before about nine hundred rabid student fans good fortunes, Junior Meds met Victoria yesterday afternoon in the Jennings Cup final at the Arena. The Meds won their group sometime ago, but lost to Victoria, who then were defeated by Pharmacy for the cup. But after they had lost Victoria, they were investigated and as a result of a number of the Pharmacy players being ineligible the semi-finals were ordered to be replayed, with the result that Junior Meds met Victoria.
