

NO CARLING ST. PAVEMENT COUNCIL ENDS THE MATTER

Special Meeting of Civic
Body Held at Noon
Today.

WILL OPPOSE POWER BILL

City of London Is Co-operating
With Other Municipalities
in the Matter.

The Carling street pavement was up before the special committee of the council at noon today, and it was decided that no pavement be put down on the street this year.

There was much discussion and little business done at the meeting. Ald. Gerry read the report of No. 2 committee, which recommended that no pavement be laid.

Ald. Saunders thought a pavement should be laid. It was decided there was a great deal of traffic on the street and the present road was in a very bad condition.

Ald. Stevenson Opposes It.

Ald. Stevenson opposed the pavement. When the Dundas street pavement was discussed last year, City Engineer Graydon had recommended that under no consideration should a pavement be laid on the street until at least a year after the sewer had been built. Now Mr. Graydon recommends that a pavement be laid on a street where the sewer had been built but a short time. Ald. Stevenson also opposed a sheet asphalt pavement, as it was absolutely no good for the heavy teaming.

Ald. Ferguson declared that it would not be wise to put the pavement down in the face of such opposition. When the property owners along the street want a pavement they will ask for it.

Ald. Saunders' Opinion.

"If you want to keep people from voting against you, don't put the pavement down," said Ald. Saunders. "If you want to swallow yourselves up ahead, as a matter of right, the pavement should go down, but if you don't want to do what's right, let it go."

Ald. Moorhead was in favor of putting the pavement down no matter what the people on the street desired. "The street was bad and we should be put in proper condition to protect the city from lawsuits. The only way to do that was to initiate the pavement."

The motion of Ald. Gerry to lay the matter over was carried.

The Power Bill.

Ald. Booth reported as to his trip to Ottawa regarding the Dominion Power Company's bill.

"Owing to the absence of Hon. Jacques Bureau, who was called to Three Rivers, his constituency owing to the great fire, said Ald. Booth, "and the absence of Hon. G. E. P. Graham, who had to go to Cornwall in connection with the canal disaster, it was impossible for the committee to settle anything about the question. However, we have several members of Parliament, and it was the opinion that the committee would deal fairly with the municipalities. The difficulty with the bill is that it has been amended since it left the Senate. When it was before that body it was all right, as a clause made it impossible for the company to sell power or enter cities or other municipalities without the consent of the municipal councils. But this has been struck out and the representatives of the municipalities want that clause amended again, making it impossible for the company to do these things without the consent of the council. It is thought that the matter is very important and we were urged to send strong deputations to Ottawa when the bill comes up next week."

Mayor Stevely.

Mayor Stevely reported that he had a conversation with Mayor Geddes of St. Thomas, who was present at Ottawa when the bill came up. Mr. Geddes informed his worship that he had written to several municipalities which had not sent representatives to Ottawa urging them to do so when the committee meets next Thursday.

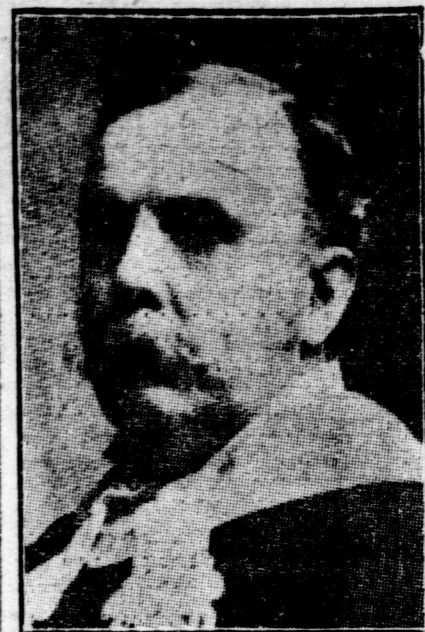
Ald. Greenlee thought the action of Mayor Geddes should be backed up by similar action on the part of the London Council. He would move that the city clerk be instructed to write to such municipalities and ask them to send representatives to Ottawa on Thursday next. This motion carried.

He also suggested that Mayor Stevely and Ald. Booth be the representatives of the council at Ottawa on Thursday next. Ald. Greenlee considered it very important that his worship should be there as he was in close touch with the matter, and would have more influence than an alderman.

Ald. Ferguson seconded the motion and it carried.

DEMONSTRATION BY SUFFRAGETTES

At Least 100,000 To Surround
House of Commons on
Tuesday Next.

London, June 26.—Convinced that their recent tactics have failed to persuade Premier Asquith to accelerate the legislative machine in their favor, the suffragettes project another novel demonstration next Tuesday with a view to exerting further pressure.

While a deputation will seek an interview with the Prime Minister, it is the intention to surround the House of Commons with a cordon of suffragettes, which the leaders predict will number at least 100,000. It will be a peaceful gathering, however, and no attempt will be made to force an entry into the House.

The House of Commons is the Government in the past year for services to science and literature includes \$1,250 yearly to Prof. Edwin Ray Lankester, director of the natural history museum, and \$250 yearly to Paul Fountaine, an American traveler and writer, the latter "in consideration of his contributions to literature and his strained circumstances."

A St. Petersburg dispatch says: A foreign office communiqué confirms the news that quiet has been re-established in Teheran. The Russian and British representatives at Teheran have taken cognizance of the intrigues of Zill Es Sultani, the uncle of the Shah, who has been warned to desist.

Although the official representations have been made to the Shah deal exclusively with the matter of the safety of Europeans in Persia, both Russia and Great Britain have strongly hinted to him that he must uphold the constitution in order to save the throne.

The Shah has vowed his determination to preserve the national constitution.
