nevolent and free; every subject a prince; the renovated earth a theatre of wonders; the renewed heart, the shrine of a personal, ever-living God; while the soul and the world, in the possession of its millennial peace, purity, light, joy, life and glory, shall exclaim, "now is come salvation!" To assist in the accomplishment of this much desired end, is the clearly defined aim of this Missionary Society. As the ocean is made up of drops, the mountain of atoms, the forest of trees, the Church of individuals, the whole of parts—we claim to form a part of the whole Missionary Church; laboring, praying, living for the

christianizing of the world.

Your Committee cannot present so flattering a report of the past year's labors, as they could desire. In some parts of the field, God has graciously poured out of his Spirit. and many souls have been hopefully converted. In other parts of our Mission ground, the absence of prosperity is both apparent and painful. Peterbororough societies are living in peace, and of many of the friends, it is said, their attachment is strong, and efforts praiseworthy; but we regret to add their numbers are less than last year. Dummer, is too stationary; its wants are,—less worldliness, and more spirituality; less avarice, and more liberality; less selfishness, and more of the mind of Jesus. A re-arrangement of the work in that mission field, as suggested by your Committee, it is hoped will be of permanent benefit. Perrytown, has passed through severe difficulties. In Hungerford, some souls have been hopefully converted. One place, Thomasburg, has been opened under favorable circumstances. A new church is in course of erection at Bethesda; but the financial state of the Mission is far from satisfactory. Huntingdon, has sustained a loss of members through removals and unfaithfulness, and still continues a dependent Mission. Seymour, amidst some discouragements, has unquestionably improved. The Tabernacle has been enlarged and renovated, and a new church is in course of erection. Oshawa, has passed through severe and exceptional trial, arising from strife, ill-feeling, and disruption; and by means of it, the efforts of one of the most gifted of the Society's agents, have been greatly hindered; but through the mercy of the ever blessed. God, the storm has become a calm, and greater oneness of spirit prevails. Prince Albert Station, has progressed numerically, financially, and spiritually. The new church, opened on Scugog Island, at a cost of \$600, free of debt, is proving a success; a site has also been purchased for a preacher's house, to be erected forthwith. The Pickering Mission, under the influence of a gracious revival, is in a prosperous state. The Scott Mission, is in great need of more of the life and power of godliness. The Fenelon Mission, has suffered through a change of preachers, during the year; but the friends are hopeful that it
