ASSAULT CASE DISPOSED OF.

The Whittaker-McMullin assault case, in which James McMullin was charged with striking Herbert Whittaker on the head with a bottle, was disposed of in the police court on Saturday afternoon, when both prosecutor and defendant were instructed by Judge Ritchie not to engage in any more futile encounters on the public sidewalks, and the defendant, for whom Mr. A. Barry was counsel, was allowed out on suspended sentence of \$20 or two months in jail.

PRINTING DISPUTE

Striking Printers in England Mulctured in Heavy Damages.
(Lloyd's Newspaper.)
A foreman named Self and thirty-three compositors and linotype operators were condemned in £260 damages by a special jury in the King's Bench Division on Friday in an action arising from a trade dispute at the works of Messrs. J. G. Hammond and Co., Fleet-lane.

The damages were claimed for alleged breach of contract. The defendants, on the other hand, said they were wrongfully dismissed, and counterclaimed for payment for work done immediately prior to the alleged breach of contract.

Mr. Dickens, K. C., for the plaintiffs, said in 1906 Messrs. Hammond had in their employ both union and non-union men. The latter were prevailed upon to join the union by Mr. T. E. Naylor, secretary of the London Compositors' Society, and when the plaintiffs declined to do so, they were discharged. The plaintiffs were called upon to leave their work at a moment's notice. Not only did the men come out, declared Mr. Dickens, but they tampered with the machinery. Judgment was entered for plaintiffs on the claim and counter-claim.

THE FUNERAL OF DR. J. H. SCAMMELL

It Was Held This Afternoon and Was Very Largely Attended.

The very large gathering of citizens from all walks of life who attended the funeral of Dr. J. Henry Scammell this afternoon was a fitting tribute to one who numbered as a friend and admirer every one who knew him. The funeral cortege, in which the various orders and societies with which the late physician was connected were largely represented as well as a large body of private citizens, was one of the longest seen in St. John for some time. The floral tributes were also very handsome and numerous.

A private family service was held at the late residence, Germain street, at 2.30 p.m., after which the body was taken to Trinity church, where service was conducted by Rev. H. A. Armstrong and J. W. B. Stewart. The various societies and orders were given special seats and relatives acted as pallbearers.

Following the service the funeral cortege formed up in the following order: Members of Court Intercolonial, I. O. F., and members of sister courts; Master George's Society; members of No. 1 and No. 2 Salvage Corps and F. P.; members of Union Lodge of Portland, F. & A. M.; members of other lodges; St. John Medical Society; Brotherhood of St. Andrew; Vestry of Trinity church; in funeral car, mourners and citizens in general.

At Fernhill cemetery, where interment was made, the regular Church of England service was held, followed by the funeral service. The floral emblems included pieces from: the graduate nurses of the nursing staff of the hospital; No. 1 S. C. & F. P.; St. John Lodge No. 7; B. P. O. Elks; Court Intercolonial, I. O. F.; Marlborough Lodge, Sons of England; Union Lodge of Portland, F. and A. M.; Dr. Ruddleick and quarantine staff at Park Island; Dr. and Mrs. Ruddleick; Mr. and Mrs. Theo. Cushing; Rev. J. E. and Mrs. Hand, and many others.

At a meeting of the profession held at noon today it was decided to attend the funeral of Dr. J. H. Scammell, in a body and a committee consisting of Dr. H. Lanney, D. E. Berryman and J. S. Bentley was appointed to draw up a resolution of condolence to be sent from the society.
Flags were flown at half mast on the post office, Customs house, U. S. Consulate, Union Club, the various fire stations and other buildings out of respect to the late assistant port physician.

The last meeting for the season of the Stone church will be held this evening at eight o'clock; an attempt will be made to have a social.
