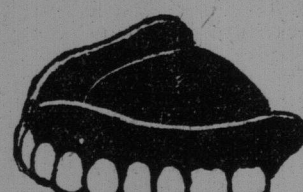

A meeting of the water and sewerage board was held yesterday afternoon at which the respective merits of the dual control water system and the single system with regulating valves were discussed. The decision arrived at after the correspondence of Director Murdoch and Engineer Barbour had been thoroughly digested practically amounts to an adoption of the regulating valve system, inasmuch as the matter depends now on what the underwriters say, and they are already on record as being in favor of the system advocated by Engineer Barbour. On motion of Alderman Baxter it was decided to ask the Underwriters' Association to appoint a committee to take the matter up with the board.

WILL EXAMINE DEPTH OF WATER

Ald. McGoldrick Says That Investigation of West Side Water Depth Will be Made Soon.

Ald. McGoldrick was asked this morning if any arrangements had yet been made to have an examination of the water depth at West Point, as recommended at the council meeting of April 12th. Ald. McGoldrick said that owing to the illness of the mayor a meeting of the sub-committee had not yet been held, but he had been assured by the officials, and by some private investigation, that there was ample water for all the steamers. However, as soon as possible the matter would be investigated thoroughly.

POLICE FOOLED BY SMART TRICK

Political Prisoners Released From Warsaw Prison in a Novel Fashion.

WARSAW, Russian Poland, April 24.—At 3 o'clock this morning seven men in carriages and dressed in uniform, the guardsmen and police drove up to the prison here and presented a false order for the delivery of ten political prisoners who were to be tried today, saying that they intended to convey them to the citadel. The prisoners were delivered to the men, who then drove away. At daylight the carriages were discovered empty on the outside of the city, the drivers bound and gagged and the discarded uniforms inside the vehicles. There was no further trace of the political prisoners or of the men who had rescued them.

THE SEAMEN'S INSTITUTE

FIRE AT GARDINER ME.

GARDINER, Maine, April 23.—Four suits, a residence and a large barn were burned to the ground, several houses were damaged and large property interests were endangered today by a fire which in two hours caused a total estimated loss of \$80,000.

It was controlled with assistance from neighboring cities. The principal losses were sustained by Gray & Hildreth, Joshua Gray & Sons, Gardiner Wood mill, and the Oakland Mfg. Co.

MILITARY MATTERS

Ottawa, Ont., April 23.—(Special)—The Imperial Government has officially consented to Canada taking over the Esquimaux garrison on May 1.
According to information gathered in militia circles, Lt. Col. J. A. Grant will enter the permanent force as principal medical officer of Esquimaux garrison. Lt. Col. Grant has been in many years principal medical officer in this district.

BIG PRICE FOR A HORSE

PARIS, April 24.—It is reported that P. C. Hays of New York, has purchased of Edmond Blanc's colt, Adam, the price being more than \$80,000.

ANTWERP, April 24.—Twelve excursionists were drowned yesterday in the river Scheldt by the capsizing of a ferry boat.

A BIG RUSH FOR SEATS

Indications are That York Theatre Will be Crowded at Big Benefit Concert—Other Benefit Shows.

There was a brisk demand for seats for the grand concert to be given in York Theatre Thursday night and of the San Francisco sufferers, when the sale opened at the box office this morning, and from present indications the York will hold the largest audience in its history on this occasion. Aside from the fact that an entertainment of exceptional merit is offered, the people seem to realize that here is a chance to help along a good cause and at the same time pass a pleasant and profitable evening.
The Turner-Weaver-Blair concert trio will provide at least half of the entertainment. Miss Irene Weaver, who possesses a fine contralto voice, will sing Frances Alliben's A Song of Thanksgiving, which is acknowledged to be one of the finest works by this talented composer and will also give a reading The Plot of the Plains, a poem from the pen of the Canadian poet, E. Pauline Johnson, besides other selections.
Miss George Turner will play Hanser's Rhapsodic Homage for the violin and the exquisite Barcarole and Pizzicati by Debussy. Chopin's Polonaise in A flat op. 26 will be included in the selection chosen by Miss Dollie Blair, who will also accompany her sister artists on the piano.
An interesting feature of the programme will be a short address by Judge G. Willich, the United States consul who is taking a great interest in the efforts that are being made to swell the relief fund. The judge is an eloquent speaker and will doubtless be given a most hearty and sympathetic reception.
At the York Theatre box office, which opened this morning, reserved seats can be booked for down stairs only. The price is 50 cents. To all other parts of the house the admission is 25 cents.
Tomorrow night the Amateur Dramatic Club will present at the Opera House the three act drama "Won At Last," which proved such a success a short time ago when given in the York Theatre.
The Opera House should be crowded on this occasion as the entire proceeds will go toward the fund for the sufferers. The Empire Dramatic Club is also giving a benefit for the relief fund in the Carleton City Hall on Friday evening. They will present a double comedy bill, a Christmas Carol and The Boston Dip, and as the proceeds will be devoted entirely to the fund there should, and no doubt will be, a generous patronage.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., April 24 (Special)—The home of Postmaster George E. Richardson at Richwoodville, Deer Island, has been quarantined for a suspected case of smallpox. A child of the postmaster, eight months old, has been under treatment for a rash for some days, and on Sunday Dr. Murray, the attending physician, pronounced it to be smallpox, and ordered the house quarantined. There has been no smallpox on the island, and apparently the only way in which it could have been contracted is by infection from the male. Mr. Richardson has a large family of children.

Osborn Budd, a prominent farmer of St. David's Ridge, has been admitted to the Mission Hospital suffering internally from injuries resulting from a kick on the back from a horse. His condition is reported considerably improved this morning.

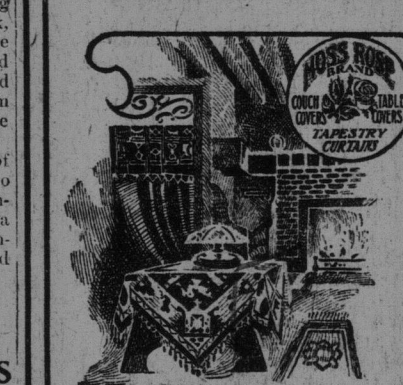
