ST. PETERSBURG, June 21, 11.50 a.m.—A mutiny, which for a time threatened to place the fortress of Sevastopol in possession of the mutineers, was suppressed yesterday, according to a special despatch to the Novo Vremya.

It appears to be confirmed that the Bolsheviks have driven out of the fortress of Sevastopol. Another report says the soldiers deliberately shot the officers of the Vologda regiment stationed in St. Petersburg, and a panic prevails in the town.

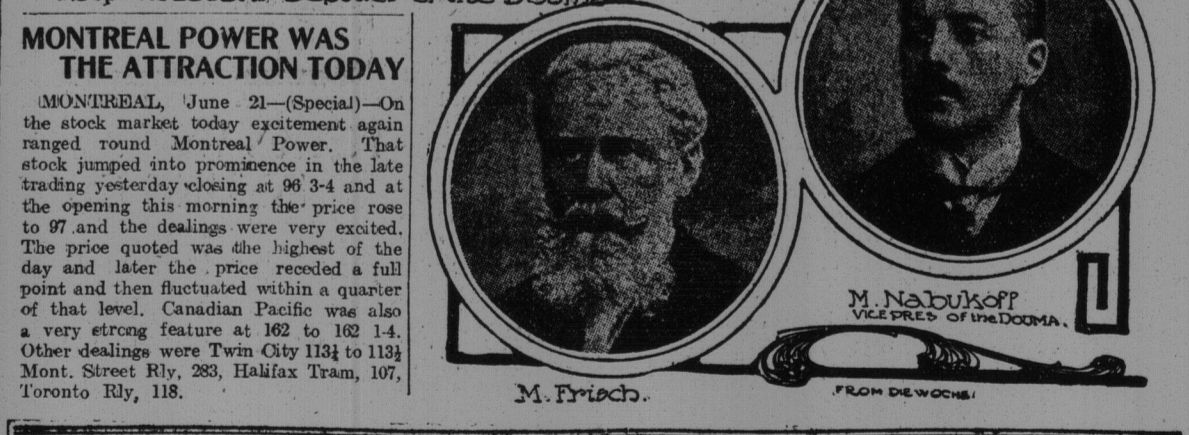
