

DEMAND FOR CONSCRIPTION  
(Continued from page 1.)  
Three years ago today, in the city of Montreal, you elected me to the honorable position of high chief ranger of this court. I can truthfully say that I sincerely appreciated the honor conferred upon me at that time; but I can truthfully say that had I been able at that time to look into the future and see that I was to be a candidate for the office to which you elected me.

Owing to the legislation enacted by the supreme court in August, 1913, and which went into effect in October of that year, every member of our order who joined prior to 1913 was called upon to make good the deficiency which existed in respect to his membership certificate, as per the plan provided by our acturers, and endorsed by the government, and decided upon by the meeting of the supreme court.

Another big factor in retarding the growth of our order has been the great war in which our empire has been engaged, which has, since August, 1914, practically prohibited us from soliciting membership among men of military age and fitness.

Notwithstanding these two great obstacles in the way of progress, our order has advanced very materially in a solid and substantial way. While it is admitted that we cannot show a gain in membership during the three years just passed, we have the satisfaction of knowing that our order has safely passed the greatest crisis in its history. Its solvency as an insurance society is now unquestioned even by our most bitter opponents. The opposition of our old members and the apathy of our new members is very much on the decline, and as soon as this great war is over, our order will be in a position financially and fraternally to go forward along the whole line and build up a membership which will even surpass the old-time records. It can be done and now is the time to lay the plans for it.

From the enormous figures of the benefits paid to members during the last year, the old reproach against fraternal societies that "you have to die to win," does not apply to an actual fact, but to a situation like the L. O. F., when it is shown that of the total claim payments of \$8,849,900 over \$1,000,000 was paid to living members in old age and disability benefits.

When last we met there was not the faintest suspicion that in such a short time our empire and this world would be plunged into such a war as has never before taken place. For over two years now our country and allies have been fighting for the right and freedom of national life to which we have been accustomed. Considering our unpreparedness, wonders have been accomplished to hold the enemy in check, but the sacrifice of men and wealth has been enormous, and it is hard to foretell what further sacrifice we will have to make. The ranks must be kept filled and I would like to give expression to the opinion which I hold that there should be no uncertain sound in this Canada of ours; that the time is ripe here and now for a form of conscription to produce the men quickly just as required, and that the call be spread over our country in an equal manner so that there will be no shirkers.

Men and brothers, we should stand together and demand an equality of service rather than spend our time and energy and money in coaxing men to fight and die for us. If this country and empire is good enough for us to live in and claim citizenship in, it is only right for us to fight if necessary, to guard our rights and privileges. Let us see to it that the sacrifices already made are not in vain.
