BRITISH PARLIAMENT ADVANCES THE MUNITIONS BILL A STAGE

London, June 7—Despite opposition by Labor members and by Sir Henry Delsiel, a Radical Liberal, the house of commons today gave a second reading to the ministry of munitions bill, and then sent the bill to a committee of the whole. The committee authorized the salary for the minister of munitions, who will be David Lloyd George. The salary is not to exceed \$25,000.


