"TACK" DALTON TO PITCH FOR SAINTS AGAINST PORTLANDS IN OLYMPIC GAME

"Beef" Malcolm Will Try for Shot Put Record at Sat. Night's Game.

What kind of a showing can "Tack" Dalton make against the heavy-hitting Portlands in their Olympic feud game on the South End diamond tomorrow afternoon, commencing at 3 o'clock? The St. John Baptist outfit are solidly behind their rising young star and believe young "Tack" will surprise the fans when he faces the three leading hitters in the City League, "Charlie" Gorman, Manager Snodgrass and Corigan. This trio is hitting a .400 and better clip and have been largely responsible for the Portlands' great bid for provincial honors. If Dalton and his teammates can down this gang, it will be a distinct feather in their caps and a record-breaking crowd is expected to be on hand when the umpires get the teams into action.

This is the first of a series of three games arranged in aid of the Olympic fund by the teams in the City League and the South End League. Every manager has heartily endorsed the project and agreed to help out those boys in France preparing for the big test.

Added interest is given these games here owing to the fact that one of St. John's own boys, "Billy" Maynes, is competing. An interesting coincidence is that these games start on Saturday at the Columbus Stadium and on that day four teams will play on the South End diamond for the fund. These games are:

Malcolm on Programme.

The contest between the Clippers and Royals is expected to develop into a keen struggle, Manager Bushman of the Royals and Manager "Jimmie" Christie of the Clippers have promised their strongest line-up. It is probable that an added feature for the evening game will be a shot-put competition with "Beef" Malcolm in the stellar role.

Malcolm competes tomorrow at Sussex, but he is ready to help out the fund by appearing at next Saturday night's game. Two Trojans, Henry Houlies and "Jack" McIsray, will be slated against him and Malcolm will try for a Maritime record. Few people in St. John have seen this boy in action since he developed into the best shot-putter in Canada today, and it is expected this opportunity will be taken by many. Manager "Joe" Fitzgerald expects to have his star, "Bunker" Murphy on the mound for the provincial champions and he will be opposed by "Les" Kerr for the Trojans.



New York, June 30.—The fight in the American League has changed from a battle royal into a pursuit of Washington which came up from fourth, made off with the coveted first place and is now two games away from a running strong. Yesterday they tore a 6 to 2 hole in the now ragged Red Sox.

Detroit again was victimized by an outbreak by the Indians who won 7 to 3. Chicago advanced to within one half game of St. Louis and Boston, who are tied for fourth, by beating the Browns 6 to 5. It was the 11th victory for Thurston.

The Giants played indolently behind Virgil Barnes who lost a 4 to 1 duel with his brother Jess of the Braves. Early in the second game of the double header Boston gave Conney a three-run lead which he held until the Giants got to him in the late innings for a five to three victory. Chicago gained a half game on the Giants by winning from Cincinnati 6 to 2.

Brooklyn won a thriller from the Phillies. Ring and Grimes struggled stubbornly for nine innings with a one to one score. Grimes allowed three runs in the 10th, but the home team wrung four out of Ring for a five to four appetizer for hearty flatbush dinners.
