While little got past without some debate, the atmosphere was rather suggestive of hurry and a palpable objective to wind up by Saturday.

The piece of legislation which was diopped was in relation to the Civil Service Commission. It sought to provide members of that board with a pension of two-thirds of their salary if retiring after 15 years of service or, by reason of incapacity, before that. The resolution went through the other day and prospects for passing the bill based upon it appeared to be propitious but when the measure came up today there was instantaneous bombardment.

Finally the Deputy Speaker ruled it out of order as being the negation of the principle of the bill which provided for 14 members. The discussion, however, enabled the Nova Scotia members to put themselves on record in favor of the rights of the province at the time when Maritime rights are a peculiarly live issue in that part of the country.

The conspicuous feature of the day of national scope, was the final enactment of the redistribution bill. The bill, which was passed after the ineffectual attempt of the Nova Scotia members to amend it, reforms the whole electoral map, gives effect to the last census, add 10 more members to the House and will be effective when the present Parliament peters out in the process of dissolution.
