

Poles Injunction Is Refused Company By Chief Justice

Surprised That There was No Answer to the Wilson Letter.

Sir Douglas Hazen's Findings re City's Lighting System.

The application of the New Brunswick Power Company for an interim injunction restraining the City of St. John from erecting the poles of their distribution system projecting through the Power Company's wires, or within three feet of them, and for the removal of such wires that have been erected in close proximity to the company's primble.


