**LOCAL NEWS**  
**THE CUTTY SARK.**  
The schooner Cutty Sark, Captain McBride, arrived yesterday at Port de France from Norfolk according to advices to Elkin & Co., her local agents.  
**STORM WARNING.**  
Storm signal No. 4 is displayed at all stations in the Bay of Fundy and along the Nova Scotia coast, indicating fresh to strong westerly gales followed by decidedly cold weather.

**PORT WAGES MATTER.**  
Agents of local shipping interests were to meet the longshoremen, coal handlers and liners in the board of trade rooms, Prince William street, this afternoon at 8 o'clock. The object of the meeting was to endeavor to come to an agreement regarding a schedule of wages for the coming season.  
**THE NEW SCHOONER.**  
The schooner Peter McIntyre, owned by Captain Peter McIntyre and his son, Allan, which was successfully launched at Moss Glen yesterday afternoon, is now in Lower Cove slip where work on her house, etc., will be completed. She will then be towed to Gregory's blocks where her masts will be installed and other work done. The owners expect to have her loaded and ready for sea by day 1.

**MILITARY.**  
The re-organization of the militia units throughout the district is progressing steadily and recruits are enlisting. It was announced at local military headquarters today that ten men had enlisted since this morning but most of them are joining Princess Patricia's light infantry at Winnipeg and are being transported there. A large number of men are wanted for the permanent force.

**IN HONOR OF MISS DOROTHY BARNES.**  
A pleasant surprise was given Miss Dorothy Barnes last evening when the girls of St. Luke's Bible Class, accompanied by their teachers, called on her at her home, 214 Britain street, and tendered her a lovely shower, in honor of her approaching marriage. A very pleasant evening was spent. Miss Barnes received some very useful and pretty presents, among them a beautiful bound book of Common Prayers and Hymns, from her teacher, Mrs. Hart.

**NO GRAIN YET IN ELEVATORS AT THIS PORT**  
There is no grain in either of the local elevators, although a small quantity is expected to arrive from the C. P. R. by the first of next week. Local shipping people and others are somewhat at a loss to understand reports recently published to the effect that large shipments of grain are being routed over the Grand Trunk and shipped from Portland, Maine, while the present conditions prevail here.  
Commissioner Bullock this morning said that he understood that the grain was being shipped from one of the oldest berths and not from the new federal pier. He said that it was rather peculiar that a government road should, in the face of the slogan, "Canadian trade through Canadian ports," favor Portland, Maine, in preference to Quebec, Montreal, Halifax and St. John.

**POWER COMPANY AND HYDRO PLAN**  
The status of the N. B. Power Company after the commencement of operations of the hydro-electric power plant at Musquash has been the subject of some consideration in and about city hall. Commissioner Bullock said this morning that the city solicitor's opinion was that, while the power company had the monopoly of street car operation in the city, they had no exclusive charter in the matter of supplying light and power.

**BEER RATION FOR DANES.**  
Copenhagen, Denmark, Nov. 12.—The Danish Government's Currency Value Commission is said to be considering the strict importation of imports, especially wine, tobacco, motor cars, manufactured cottons and other goods, and the strict rationing of beer, butter, wheat, flour and sugar.

London, Eng., Nov. 12.—Two hundred dancing teachers were shown a new tango which was given official approval. It is a simple "glidy" affair, being a combination of the slow walk, Argentine walk, promenade and quartette.

Regarding his possible succession as chief of inland, he said he had not the least idea who would be appointed.

He said that the government had accepted McAlinh's resignation at the meeting before the last one, but that the inspector had not yet been asked to return his badge. Mr. McAlinh, however, told a Times reporter this morning that he was still on duty.
