TRAIN OFF TRACK

Sherbrooke, Que., April 7—Traffic was held up for several hours between Sherbrooke and Montreal on the Grand Trunk line yesterday when a freight train jumped the rails near Upton. The freight consisted of about thirty empty cars and about fifteen of these jumped the rails and rolled down the embankment. Three members of the train crew were injured, but none apparently seriously. Doctors were called and those hurt were taken to Montreal last night. The passengers on the train which leaves here for Montreal were transferred to another train on the west side of the wreck and arrived at their destination about five hours late, while passengers coming here from Montreal on the evening train were also transferred about two hours late.

This morning the wreck was all clear. A broken rall is thought to have been the cause of the wreck.

desire the benefits of the act they can receive them by making an assignment. The bill, of course, is somewhat complicated, and contains a vast number of provisions which are more or less technical.

"The machinery for administering the act is to be the Superior Courts of the \$20.50 per hundred weight and hogs at provinces. The bill does not seek to establish any new court for the administration at \$10 to \$16.
